Ripperdan Community Day School is currently a CSI school based on our red range performance on the California Dashboard.

Ripperdan Community Day School works with the school and community stakeholders to align the School Plan for Student Achievement to both the LCAP and the school's site goals. Students at Ripperdan have behavior challenges and need supports in order to access the curriculum. All students' learning includes rigorous content that prepares them to be college and career-ready. This is the main focus of our work at Ripperdan Community Day School. To ensure this learning, we must take into consideration the population of students that we serve. Ripperdan Community Day School aims to help students recover their education after struggling at the comprehensive school sites. Most of Ripperdan Community Day School's 65 students are behind in credits. This credit deficit represents a gap in the achievement of grade-level standards, disconnection from school, and evidence of a lack of connection to adults at school. This plan aims to support students in achieving grade-level standards, provide intervention for learning skill gaps, support the development of college and career readiness, help students rediscover a love of learning, and foster mentoring relationships with school staff.

Involvement Process for the SPSA and Annual Review and Update

The site general budget and Title 1 budget for the 2024-2025 school year were reviewed, discussed, and approved by the school site staff, community members, site leadership, and the School Site Council in May 2024 Current site goals were discussed and input and insights were obtained from parents, teachers, school staff, and students at the time. The school site plan (SPSA) goals and actions for the 2024-2025 school year were discussed and reviewed with all teachers, students, and parents in May 2024 The SPSA plan was updated based on teacher, school staff, parent, and student input and insights. Student learning and academic needs were discussed. The Title 1 budget was approved by SSC in May 2024. Their input and ideas in terms of budget spending and allocations are reflected within the SPSA.

The suspension rate indicator overall has our site in the red zone. We hired a full-time Intervention Specialist. We are set to hire an RTI teacher to support our students "at promise". We have a full-time Student advocate, as well as investing in Suite 360 SEL computer programming to help target our student SEL needs.

Referring to the California School Dashboard (Dashboard), any state indicator for which performance for any student group was two or more performance levels below the "all student" performance.

There are no student groups two or more performance levels below the "all student" performance.

Other Needs

In addition to Dashboard data, other needs may be identified using locally collected data developed by the LEA to measure pupil outcomes.

Ripperdan staff wrote 796 referral RHINOs in the 2023-2024 school year. 337 of those were for major referrals and 459 were for minor referrals. 34% of students were suspended while attending Ripperdan in the 2023-2024 academic year. 99% of students are reading below grade level as measured by the American Reading Company's IRLA.

If we build the capacity of our teachers in the areas of restorative practices, relationship building, PBIS, and SEL instruction using trauma informed practices then we will reduce the suspension and referrals at Ripperdan by providing adequate social-emotional support and instruction as positive behavior support plans. By increasing our students' capacity for self-regulation and focus, we will have a reduction of 10% of student suspensions and 25% of student referrals by the end of the year.

If we build the capacity of our teachers in the areas of literacy instruction then we will improve student reading levels for students at Ripperdan by providing increasing capacity for literacy instruction. By increasing our students' capacity for self regulation and focus, we will have an increase of 90% of students improving 1.5 grade levels in reading level, as measured by the ARC IRLA.

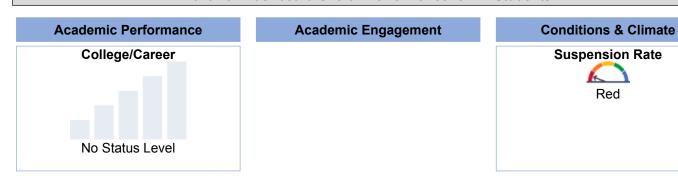








2023 Fall Dashboard Overall Performance for All Students

The school may include data voluntarily developed by districts to measure pupil outcomes (described in the Identified Need).
 - b. Be based on academic achievement information about all students in the school, including all groups under §200.13(b)(7) and migratory children as defined in section 1309(2) of the ESEA, relative to the State's academic standards under §200.1 to:
 - i. Help the school understand the subjects and skills for which teaching and learning need to be improved.
 - ii. Identify the specific academic needs of students and groups of students who are not yet achieving the State's academic standards.
 - iii. Assess the needs of the school relative to each of the components of the schoolwide program under §200.28.
 - iv. Develop the comprehensive needs assessment with the participation of individuals who will carry out the schoolwide program plan.
 - v. Document how it conducted the needs assessment, the results it obtained, and the conclusions it drew from those results.
 - B. Identification of the process for evaluating and monitoring the implementation of the SPSA and progress towards accomplishing the goals set forth in the SPSA (described in the Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes and Annual Review and Update).

Requirements for the Plan

- II. The SPSA shall include the following:
 - A. Goals set to improve pupil outcomes, including addressing the needs of student groups as identified through the needs assessment.
 - B. Evidence-based strategies, actions, or services (described in Strategies and Activities)

- A description of the strategies that the school will be implementing to address school needs, including a description of how such strategies will:
 - a. Provide opportunities for all children including each of the subgroups of students to meet the challenging state academic standards
 - b. Use methods and instructional strategies that:
 - i. Strengthen the academic program in the school,
 - ii. Increase the amount and quality of learning time, and
 - iii. Provide an enriched and accelerated curriculum, which may include programs, activities, and courses necessary to provide a well-rounded education.
 - c. Address the needs of all children in the school, but particularly the needs of those at risk of not meeting the challenging State academic standards, so that all students demonstrate at least proficiency on the State's academic standards through activities which may include:
 - i. Strategies to improve students' skills outside the academic subject areas;
 - ii. Preparation for and awareness of opportunities for postsecondary education and the workforce;
 - iii. Implementation of a schoolwide tiered model to prevent and address problem behavior;
 - iv. Professional development and other activities for teachers, paraprofessionals, and other school personnel to improve instruction and use of data; and
 - v. Strategies for assisting preschool children in the transition from early childhood education programs to local elementary school programs.
- C. Proposed expenditures, based on the projected resource allocation from the governing board or body of the LEA (may include funds allocated via the ConApp, federal funds, and any other state or local funds allocated to the school), to address the findings of the needs assessment consistent with the state priorities, including identifying resource inequities, which may include a review of the LEAs budgeting, it's LCAP, and school-level budgeting, if applicable (described in Proposed Expenditures and Budget Summary).  - 2. Provide sufficient information on which to base effective assistance to those students.
- G. For an elementary school, a description of how the school will assist preschool students in the successful transition from early childhood programs to the school.
- H. A description of how the school will use resources to carry out these components (described in the Proposed Expenditures for Strategies/Activities).
- I. A description of any other activities and objectives as established by the SSC (described in the Strategies/Activities).
