

### Dual Language Coming to MUSD

TWO YEARS AGO, the parents of Madera Unified School District who were involved in District English Language Advisory Committee expressed interest in the Dual Language Instruction Program (DLI). The program is for English, Spanish, and



bilingual speakers at the kindergarten level who will progress in their studies by learning both languages throughout their education. The parents discussed their fascination for the DLI program with the former English Language Development Director, which resulted in taking a trip to a school with the program already being practiced to get a better understanding of how the program operated. Parents, district board members, and the ELD director visited the school and were amazed by what they saw.

"The parents got the initiative going. They thought that this would be something that would be very beneficial for the community of Madera," said Nora Guillén, the English Learner Coordinator. "From there, the ball just started rolling. People saw what the program could offer. They saw the benefits for the kids just by sitting and talking to them," stated Guillén.

According to Janet Sevor Grossnicklaus, the director of curriculum, instruction, and assessment, the main language focus in the Dual Language Instruction Program is English and Spanish due to the majority of Spanish and English speakers in Madera. "I think one of the constructs of the program is that you're looking for 50% native speakers of the target language and 50% of, for example, English," Grossnicklaus said. However, they had to take into consideration the class composition and the balance of the children within the school site that was chosen for the program. To expand the DLI to other languages would require a significant number of people who spoke the targeted language.



As an educator for 25 years, Mr. Lile has demonstrated a love of teaching and learning. His educational career began in Clovis Unified, where he served for a combined six years between Clovis High, Clovis West, and the Center for Advanced Research and Technology (CART), where he was an original staff member and psychology teacher. He and his wife Jessica Zapata-Lile, also of Madera, taught overseas in Escuela Americana Honduras for two years and then at Dubai American Academy for five years as an International Baccalaureate history teacher. Mr. and Mrs. Lile have traveled widely in the both Old and New Worlds together and often with students. After the birth of their first of three sons (Luke, Ian, and Benjamin respectively), Mr. and Mrs. Lile returned to California, where he eventually served as a vice principal and principal at Madera South High School. In 2015, Mr. Lile assumed the role of Chief Academic Officer for Secondary in Madera Unified. He is able to speak conversational Spanish and reads as much as possible about a wide variety of subjects, ranging from education and psychology to history and current events. •

The prerequisite in hiring qualified teachers for this program depends on how many current teachers in the district hold a bilingual certification to teach in two languages with a Spanish-language focus. The district has stated that the application process with the teachers began in January. "We held an informational meeting, and there were thirteen teachers in our district who were very interested in the program." said Guillén.

Many parents attended the 32 meetings and parent community workshops provid-

we hope that they take advantage of that and be as active as they can, but if a parent cannot be involved, that will not be a deal breaker," explained Guillén.

On November 15, 2016, Madison Elementary was chosen as the site for the first DLI program in Madera Unified School District. Applications for the Dual Language Instruction Program became available in December 2016 for all parents and families in the district.

Due to the promising future and benefits for the children, the Dual Language Instruction Program will be in effect in August 2017 for the incoming kindergarteners. According to current research, the children who start at a younger age and have a minimum commitment of five to seven years will see the true benefits of bilingualism and biliteracy in both English and Spanish. There will be five kindergarten classes with the maximum of 24 students in each class, totaling 120 students. These students will become the first cohort of the program. The students will move together each year even through middle school and high school.

### New Elementary School on the Eastside

THERE ARE VARIOUS elementary schools in the Madera Unified School District. Soon, there will be a new addition to our growing home of Madera: Virginia Lee Rose Elementary. This new innovative K–6th school will open during the 2017–2018 school year. "The thing that makes this school so special is that it will have a dedicated music room, which other schools in this district do not have," said Director of Facilities and Construction, Rosalind Cox.

In addition, the Virginia Lee Rose Elementary will have an After School Program (ASP), a concession stand, and an amphitheater for ebullient school activities. "At other elementary schools, they usually have the classrooms outside of the building, like



Alpha. But the Virginia Lee Rose Elementary will have their classes held inside the building, so it'll create a safer environment for the children," said Cox.

The new, imaginative campus will be located on the southwest corner of Road 28 and Avenue 14½, also known as Tozer and Sunrise. Altogether, the school will be about 70,000 square feet on 16 acres. It will accommodate up to 850 students. Oral E. Micham is the general contractor, who also contributed to the construction of Cesar Chavez Elementary School. The architect, SIM Architects Inc., is responsible for designing the K–6th school, and it will have a modern, Tuscan look.

The principal will be Lisa Fernandez, who was previously the principal at Madison Elementary. Altogether, along with the experienced workers contributing to build such a magnificent, secure, and exhilarating campus for K–6 students, the diverse activities that they will engage in will make the many school years to come very valuable.

The name for the school was chosen in April 2016 as a dedication to a woman named Virginia Lee Rose, who was a phenomenal individual volunteering her time to the community. Virginia Lee Rose was an inspiring woman who could best be described as a loving and affecting the control of the community.



tionate person. "She was very loving, and was definitely a hugger!" said daughter Margaret Graham.

In addition to her devoted personality, Mrs. Rose volunteered at 17 communities that

"My mother was a great supporter of Madera County and was a voice for everyone," stated Graham. "She believed that everyone was the same, and not one person was different from another. She was very giving to everyone. She made sure that people

ate and slept, she was very religious, and she was very hard-working," shared Graham. Virginia Lee Rose believed that education was the key to success. As her daughter explained, "My mom moved to Madera when she was nineteen years old, and she got her GED (General Education Development) and an associate's degree. School was extremely

important to her as well."

Virginia Lee Rose passed away in 2014, but her legacy continues to thrive today and will continue in the many years to come. She was the first female in Madera to have a school named after her. The great thing is that the school is being built right across the street from where she first started volunteering. Virginia Lee Rose was and still is an immensely meritorious and utterly inspiring woman who brings back hope to the entire community. Her dedicated devotion and enthusiasm has, without a doubt, created a legacy for her children and grandchildren. Mrs. Rose's actions unceasingly have a positive impact on the young men and women in Madera County, and she serves as a model of inspiration and hope for everyone.

### Elementary Counselor Shaping Lives

Madera Unified, unlike most other districts, is fortunate enough to have a counselor working to counsel elementary students within the community. Veronica Garcia is an elementary school counselor

who works regularly at the K–8 country schools such as LaVina and Eastin-Arcola. Garcia sees students from all grades. They come to her with conflicts that could distract them from focusing on school. Some examples of these conflicts are friendship problems, parent divorces, grief from losing a loved one, and other social or emotional issues that affect the student. She carries a wide knowledge of ways to assist these students in healing and prevailing through their situations.

"My job is not to fix anything. I am not a therapist, but I am here to help the students get through whatever they're going through and give them some coping skills to make them more resilient, because life has its ups and downs, and we have to be able to cope with them," Garcia commented.

She prefers not to talk with students, but instead to build crafts with them, STUDENTS utilizing objects like Play-Doh, balloons, and glitter. She creates items that help the students COUNSELOR visualize and recognize their ROMINISTRATORS emotions. One example is her homemade "Cool-Down Bottle," a bottle filled with water and glitter that studentsif they are angry—shake until the glitter is stirred up. After they shake the bottle, she has them perform deep breathing exercises until the glitter has once again settled. Garcia stresses the

importance of deep breathing because it allows oxygen into the brain, and this not only calms people but improves decision-making. This increases the likelihood that



the children will make good choices. "Good choices equal fun, bad choices equal no fun," Garcia stated. She wants the students to realize that they are the ones who decide whether or not they make these good choices.

Garcia, a Fresno State graduate with a Master's in Student Counseling along with a Minor in Communication Disorders and a Bachelor's in Mass Communications and Journalism (with an emphasis in public relations), became interested in child counseling through her autistic son and his teachers. She started out being a counselor at Madera South High School but knew that her main interest lay in the way she can help children.

She explains that her degrees help her "relate to people and just have that open mind like a journalist, and doing the best ... my product is the student."

Garcia opened up about negative experiences with her high school counselor and refuses to bring those negative comments

"If you can dream it, then you

can achieve it. Let's work for it. You know, the only person who's going to stop you from

reaching your goal is you, so if you really want something, let's come up with a plan so we can get there," Garcia said.

# Growing Schools for a Growing Community

MADERA UNIFIED IS approaching a new era in its history since the unification of the school district in 1965. Madera Unified is making progress in evolving and adapting to the new innovative world we live in. In response to a growing community and aging facilities, the district has created the 12-Year Plan to help expand the district and to build innovative facilities within the next 12 years to help students in their educational endeavors. This was issued by former Superintendent Edward C. González last year and was approved by the ((? building plan of trustees ?)) in January 2017. The staff of Madera Unified School District has worked









alongside the district board throughout the process of developing the plan for the past year. To simplify the planning process, the 12-Year Plan was divided into three phases. Each phase of the plan needs the approval of the board to move forward.

The expansion of the district will include two new elementary schools, three new middle schools, and two new high schools. The district is also securing architects for the modernization of the Madera High School (MHS) industrial arts building, the concurrent middle school, and the athletic facilities at Madera South High School (MSHS). The first construction, currently in progress, is the Virginia Lee Rose Elementary School; the groundbreaking ceremony was held on August 18, 2016, and the school will open in August 2017. The new elementary is meant to have an innovative and welcoming architectural design. The design for the new high school is in the final stages and will open in August 2019.

Former Superintendent González stated that the biggest obstacle in the 12-Year Plan was "to articulate to the Board and the community rationale for minimizing our borrowing by establishing a Building Fund set aside that we adhere to annually." MUSD has found an efficient way to save money and supply for school demands instead of taking loans.

The main goal of this promising plan is to "provide the best education for our students, and thereby better prepare our students for the world that they inherit," stated González. With the guidance of former Superintendent González, the district has made

all schools equally beneficial to each student as a part of their "integrated plan to address overcrowded conditions and bring our students into the world of 21st-century learning," said González.

As the expansion continues throughout the 12 years, the City of Madera should look forward to the new improvements and advancements of our growing school district and watch not only the students but the community grow as well.
