MADERA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

CONSULTANT SERVICES AGREEMENT

This agreement is made and entered into this 24th day of September 2013, by and between Madera Unified School District ("District") and Madera County Arts Council (MCAC). ("Consultant").

- Consultant agrees to provide the following specified services:
 MCAC will assign artist to provide art services to students in the Madera Unified School District Afterschool Program at multiple sites based on the California Sate Standards for the Arts.
- 2. <u>Term.</u> The Consultant's services described in Paragraph 1 shall commence on August 20, 2013 and shall end on June 6, 2014 unless earlier terminated pursuant to Paragraph 8.
- Payment. District agrees to pay Consultant as follows:
 \$4500 Per site paid by After School Grant Funds
 Supplies and Administrative Costs will be paid directly to Consultant. District will pay the Artists directly at \$23/hour for a combined total not to exceed \$4500 per site.
- 4. <u>Payroll Forms.</u> Consultant agrees to complete the District's consultant payroll form. Consultant agrees that failure to properly complete this form in a timely manner may result in nonpayment to consultant.
- 5. <u>Independent Contractor Status.</u> Consultant and any and all agents and employees of Consultant are agreed to be independent contractors in their performance under this Agreement and are not officers, employees, or agents of the District. Consultant shall retain the right to perform services for others during the term of this Agreement.
- 6. <u>Indemnity.</u> Consultant shall indemnify, defend, and save and hold harmless the District, its Board of Trustees, officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims, damages, losses, causes of actions, and demands, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs, incurred in connection with the processing or defense of any matter, claim, lawsuit or contest arising out of Consultant's performance of or failure to perform the work required by this Agreement.
- 7. <u>Insurance.</u> Consultant agrees to purchase and maintain throughout the term of this Agreement a comprehensive general liability insurance policy to protect Consultant from damages because of bodily injury, including death, and from claims for damages to property which may arise out of or result from Consultant's responsibilities under this Agreement, whether such acts or omissions be by Consultant or anyone directly or indirectly employed by Consultant. This insurance shall name the District as additional insured and shall be written for not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) for property damage. A certificate of insurance shall be filed with the District and shall provide that no changes shall be made to such insurance without thirty (30) days prior written notice to the District.
- 8. <u>Termination of Agreement.</u> District may terminate this Agreement for any reason upon written notice to Consultant. In the event of early termination, Consultant shall be paid for satisfactory work performed to the date of termination. The District may then proceed with the work in any manner the district deems proper.
- 9. <u>No Entitlement.</u> Consultant agrees that it has no entitlement to any future contracts or work from District or to any employment or fringe benefits from the District.
- 10. <u>Taxes.</u> Payment to Consultant pursuant to this Agreement will be reported to federal and state taxing authorities as required on the IRS Form 1099. District will not withhold any money from compensation payable to Consultant. In particular, District will not withhold FICA (social security); state or federal unemployment insurance contributions; and/or state or federal income tax or disability insurance. Consultant is independently responsible for the payment of all applicable taxes.
- 11. <u>Governing Law and Venue.</u> This Agreement shall be governed by and construed only in accordance with the laws of the State of California. If any action is initiated involving the application or interpretation of this

Agreement, venue shall only lie in the appropriate state court in Madera County or federal court in Fresno County, California.

- 12. <u>Binding Effect.</u> This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon the Consultant, the District and their respective successors and assignees.
- 13. <u>Severability.</u> If any provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such holdings shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision of this Agreement.
- 14. <u>Amendment.</u> The terms of this Agreement shall not be amended in any manner whatsoever except by written agreements signed by the parties.

- 17. <u>Compliance with Law.</u> Consultant agrees to perform the services contemplated by this Agreement in a professional and a competent manner and in compliance with all local, state and federal laws, and regulations governing the service to be rendered pursuant to this Agreement.
- 18. <u>Board Approval.</u> The parties agree that the effectiveness of the Agreement is contingent upon approval by the District's Board of Trustees.
- 19. <u>Equipment and Materials.</u> Consultant shall provide all equipment, materials, and supplies necessary for the performance of this Agreement. This provision may be negotiable as to the needs of specific children.
- 20. <u>Non-discrimination</u>. Consultant shall not engage in unlawful discrimination in the employment of persons because of race, color national origin, age, ancestry, religion, sex, marital status, medical condition, physical handicap, or other bias prohibited by state or federal law.
- 21. <u>Copyright.</u> Any product, whether in writing or maintained in any other form produced under this Agreement shall be the property of District. District shall have the right to secure a patent, trademark or copyright and the product or information may not be used in any manner without District's written permission.
- 22. In accordance with Education Code Section 39656, this contract is not valid or an enforceable obligation against the District until approved or ratified by motion of the Governing Board duly passed and adopted.

AGENCY SHALL:

- 1. Comply with all Board approved ROP policies.
- 2. Designate as "ROP" all classes offered pursuant to this agreement in bulletins, articles, and schedules, promotional materials, website, etc.
- 3. Administer, supervise and conduct the programs as indicated above and in the attached budgets.
- 4. Recruit and enroll qualified students.
- 5. Provide properly credentialed instructors for the classes pursuant to the provisions set forth in the attached budget and are qualified in accordance with State ROP course certification standards and requirements.
- 6. Provide the necessary and appropriate facilities to conduct Fresno ROP classes as indicated in each attached budget at no cost to Fresno ROP.
- 7. Submit reports and information to Fresno ROP, including, but not limited to the following data:
 - a. Statement of costs;
 - b. Certified equipment inventories;
 - c. Documentation certifying each instructor's credential, work experience, and educational background;
 - d. Scan class attendance accounting records on prescheduled timeline as requested. Teacher's signature on original class attendance records must be submitted to Fresno ROP central office for monitoring on a regular basis;
 - e. Curriculum materials, student objectives, and other instructional materials as necessary; and
 - f. Names and work duties of all funded partially or in full by Fresno ROP.
- 8. Include Fresno ROP on all advisory committees established for Fresno ROP contracted courses. Comply with Fresno ROP Advisory Committee policy.
- 9. Present to Fresno ROP for approval, prior to initiation, any revisions affecting time and/or location of classes or additional sections.
- 10. Issue Fresno ROP Certificates of Completion provided by Fresno ROP to those students who meet Fresno ROP Completer policy.
- 11. Issue Fresno ROP Student Competency List to individual students in accordance with Fresno ROP guidelines.
- 12. Issue Parents Letters for students who have successfully completed the ROP program.
- 13. Provide appropriate forms and documentation as required by Title V of the California Administration Code when using community classroom or cooperative vocational education methodology.
- 14. When using Community Classroom methodology, Agency must provide student with employee Workers' Compensation insurance and liability insurance equivalent to that provided by Fresno ROP if Agency does not use insurance supplied by Fresno ROP.
- 15. Include Fresno ROP management staff in the hiring process of all certificated staff funded with ROP funds.

FCSS OBLIGATIONS (see Art. 1 & 1A). FCSS' obligations under this Agreement include the following:

FCSS SHALL:

- 1. Pay the Agency the actual costs of the Programs listed above as shown on the "Fresno ROP Claims for Funds" forms and according to the following provisions:
 - a. Total payments shall not exceed Program budgets as approved;
 - b. Full payment shall be made provided A.D.A. estimated in the approved attached budgets is generated. Should the classes generate less A.D.A. than estimated on the budgets, reimbursement by Fresno ROP shall be prorated accordingly.
 - c. Payment to the Agency shall be made within a reasonable time following receipt of Claim as provided on the "Fresno ROP Claim for Funds" form.
- 2. Receive, compile, monitor and submit A.D.A. information for Fresno ROP activities of Agency for State Apportionment as provided for in Education Code Section 52321.
- 3. Purchase capital outlay items for Agency pursuant to this Agreement in accordance with the following procedures:
 - a. All capital outlay items for which inventory records are required will be purchased by Fresno ROP. Pursuant to this Agreement, any item (not a supply) that costs more than *five hundred dollars* (\$500.00) is *CAPITAL OUTLAY*. The capital outlay items become the property of Fresno County Superintendent of Schools.
 - b. Purchases will be initiated in accordance with equipment purchase request submitted by the Agency.

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS. Each of the following document ("Required Documents") shall be provided in accordance with the following:

- 1. PAYMENT DOCUMENT. At the Payor Party's request and as applicable, Taxpayer Identification Number Request (W-9) and other documents that may be required to process payment to the Payee Party (see § 1A.3).
- 2. PROOF OF INSURANCE. Each Party, upon the other Party's request, shall provide written proof that the following insurance, which may include self-insurance, is in effect during the Contract Term (see § Art. 4): (A) commercial general liability, (B) workers compensation and employer's liability, and (C) commercial automobile liability.

In consideration of the covenants, conditions, and stipulations in and for good and valuable consideration and/or the mutual benefits to be derived from this Agreement, Agency and FCSS, separately referred to as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties," hereby enter into this Agreement. Unless this Agreement states or the context requires otherwise, any reference to a Party shall mean the Party and its governing body, officers, employees, and agents, and, if Agency is a school district or charter school, includes Agency's students. ARTICLE 1 SCOPE OF SERVICES AND OBLIGATIONS.

SECTION 1.1 SCOPE. Fresno ROP is authorized to establish and maintain Regional Occupational Program activities within Fresno, Madera, and Mariposa Counties. The Agency wishes to cooperate in establishing and maintaining Fresno ROP programs in the Agency. By this Agreement, the Parties desire to set forth the terms and conditions upon which the Parties shall cooperate and share responsibility for performance of this Agreement and to set forth the Parties' rights and obligations relating to this Agreement. In addition to the items set forth in the Cover of this document regarding the Parties' responsibilities, the Parties also agree to the following general provisions:

- 1.1.1 Budget changes that do not increase the total budgeted expenditures for Fresno ROP classes may be authorized by mutual consent of Fresno ROP and the Agency.
- 1.1.2. All capital outlay purchased pursuant to this Agreement is property of FCSS/Fresno ROP.
- 1.1.3. Use of Fresno ROP equipment, and/or property, is limited to Fresno ROP class(es), unless other purposes with specific conditions are authorized by Fresno ROP.
- 1.1.4. A Fresno ROP attached class budget may be terminated at any time by mutual consent of the parties. If terminated, the Agency shall be reimbursed for approved expenditures to date of termination.
- 1.1.5. All Fresno ROP classes must be approved by the Advisory Board of Management and meet California Department of Education's certification guidelines.
- 1.1.6. This Agreement is subject to being terminated by Fresno ROP at any time in the event that adequate funding for Fresno ROP is not approved.
- 1.1.7. In the event of loss, theft, or damage to Fresno ROP equipment and/or property, Agency shall reimburse Fresno ROP the value of its loss, or replace the items at the discretion of Fresno ROP.

SECTION 1.2 WORK SUPERVISION. Except as may be specifically stated on the Cover, each Party shall be solely responsible for: (A) the acts and omissions of its officers, employees, agents, and any other persons who it retains to perform any portion of this Agreement; and (B) taking all reasonable precautions for the safety and prevention of injury to the person of and damage or loss to the property of its officers, employees, agents and any other persons who it retains to perform any portion of this Agreement or to any officers, employees, agents, students, or invitees of the other Party or any third party.

ARTICLE 1A ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS.

SECTION 1A.1 WORK PRODUCTS AND RIGHTS THERETO. Unless stated otherwise on the Cover, the following applies to any data, document, display, drawing, report, material, invention, work, and discovery (whether written, recorded, or electronically stored), including any copyright, right, and interest therein or thereto (collectively "Work"), that a Party prepares for or provides to the other Party pursuant to this Agreement: (A) the Work of each Party shall remain its property and that Party shall have all rights thereto; (B) each Party grants to the other Party a limited license during the Contract Term to use and reproduce the other Party's Work for the purpose of performing this Agreement; and (C) upon termination of this Agreement and a Party's request, the other Party shall return any Work that belongs to the requesting Party. The provisions of this Section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

SECTION 1A.2 CONFIDENTIAL RECORDS AND INFORMATION. If any document and/or information (e.g., employee or student records) that are subject to nondisclosure or protection under federal and/or California laws (collectively "Confidential Materials") are provided to or created by a Party for or pursuant to this Agreement, the Party shall: (A) not release, disseminate, publish, or disclose the Confidential Materials except as required by law or a court order, as this Agreement may permit, or as the other Party may authorize in writing; (B) not use the Confidential Materials for any purpose not related to the performance of this Agreement; and (C) protect and secure the Confidential Materials, including those that are saved or stored in an electronic form, to ensure that they are safe from theft, loss, destruction, erasure, alteration, and unauthorized viewing, duplication, and use. The provisions of this Section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

SECTION 1A.3 REQUIRED DOCUMENTS. A Party must provide to the other Party the Required Documents that are required from the Party as applicable and marked on the Cover, each of which is incorporated by reference into and constitutes a part of this Agreement. If any Required Document becomes incorrect during the Contract Term, the Party providing the Required Document shall promptly notify in writing and/or submit to the other Party the appropriate document reflecting the correct information.

SECTION 1A.4 COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS AND GRANT. Each Party shall comply with all federal and California laws applicable to its performance of this Agreement. Each provision of law required to be inserted in or that applies to this Agreement shall be deemed inserted herein, and this Agreement shall be read and enforced as though such provision of law is inserted herein. If funds from any grant are used to pay for this Agreement, each Party shall comply with all terms and conditions of the grant that are applicable to it.

ARTICLE 2 PAYMENT.

Compensation under this Agreement shall be as set forth on the Cover.

ARTICLE 3 TERM AND TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT.

SECTION 3.1 CONTRACT TERM. This Agreement shall become effective on the Effective Date stated on the Cover and shall continue in full force and effect thereafter until and including the Termination Date stated on the Cover ("Contract Term"), unless this Agreement is terminated during the Contract Term in accordance with Section 3.2 below.

SECTION 3.2 GROUNDS FOR TERMINATION. This Agreement shall terminate upon expiration of the Contract Term. During the Contract Term, this agreement may be terminated at any time by mutual consent of the Parties. If terminated, the Agency shall be reimbursed for approved expenditures incurred before the effective date of termination of this Agreement. Despite any contrary provisions in this Agreement, FCSS may terminate this Agreement at any time, effective on the date stated in FCSS' written notice of termination to Agency, in the event FCSS, the Fresno County Board of Education, and/or any entity from which FCSS receives or is to receive funds to pay for this Agreement, reduces or eliminates some or all such funds, or fails to appropriate or determines not to appropriate sufficient funds to make payments under this Agreement for which FCSS is responsible.

SECTION 3.3 FORCE MAJEURE. A Party is not liable for failing or delaying performance of this Agreement due to events that are beyond the Party's reasonable control and occurring without its fault or negligence, for example, acts of God such as tornadoes, lightning, earthquakes, hurricanes, floods, or other natural disasters (collectively "Force Majeure") provided that the Party has notified the other Party in writing of the occurrence of the Force Majeure, except that a Force Majeure shall not excuse a Payor Party's payment of any amount that is due to the Payee Party under this Agreement where the Payee Party has performed services for which payment is sought and submitted an itemized invoice to the Payor Party. The Payee Party shall not be entitled to any payment for services that the Payee Party did not perform during the period of the Force Majeure.

ARTICLE 4 INSURANCE.

Each Party, at its cost and during the Contract Term, shall maintain in effect insurance or self-insurance that complies, at a minimum, with the following requirements, and shall provide written proof of such insurance to the other Party upon the other Party's request: (A) commercial general liability with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 general aggregate and with coverage for property damage, bodily injury, and personal and advertising injury; (B) workers compensation with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 or as required by California laws, whichever is greater; and employer's liability insurance of not less than \$1,000,000; and (C) commercial automobile liability covering, at a minimum, all owned, non-owned, and hired autos or any auto, with a combined single limit of not less than \$1,000,000 per accident.

ARTICLE 5 INDEMNITY.

Except as specifically stated otherwise on the Cover, each Party's indemnity, defense, and hold harmless obligations to the other Party under this Agreement are as follows: (A) a Party ("Indemnitor") shall indemnify and hold harmless the other Party ("Indemnitee") to the full extent permitted by California laws for any Loss (excluding attorney's fees and litigation costs that the Indemnitee or a Third Party incurred or paid related to the Loss) sustained by the Indemnitee or a Third Party only in proportion to the Indemnitor's liability based on the determination of a governmental entity with jurisdiction to make such a determination or a court of competent jurisdiction, whichever determination is final; and (B) each Party shall defend and pay for all of its attorney's fees and litigation costs related to any Claim or Loss without any right to indemnity and/or hold harmless of such fees and costs, or any right to defense, from the other Party. A Party who intends to seek or seeks indemnity and/or hold harmless of any Loss from the other Party: (1) shall notify the other Party in writing and within a reasonable time after the Party knows or becomes aware of any Claim that may or will result in a Loss, describing, if known or determinable, the pertinent circumstances, all entities and persons involved, and the amount being claimed; and (2) shall not settle or otherwise resolve the Claim until it has notified the other Party of the Claim in accordance with the preceding provision (1) and given the other Party written notice and an opportunity to participate in and to consent to the settlement or resolution of the Claim, which consent the other Party shall not unreasonably withhold. A Party's obligations under this Article are not limited to or by any insurance that it maintains or

the lack of insurance but apply to the full extent permitted by California laws. "Claim" means any claims, demands, lawsuits, causes of action, actions, cross-complaints, cross-actions, and/or proceedings arising out of, resulting from, or related to this Agreement where there has been no final determination of liability by a governmental entity with jurisdiction to make such a determination or a court of competent jurisdiction. "Loss" means any bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, advertising injury, liability, loss, judgment, expense, and/or cost arising out of, resulting from, or relating to this Agreement and for which there has been a final determination by a governmental entity with jurisdiction to make such a determination or a court of competent jurisdiction that a Party is or both Parties are liable. "Third Party" means a person who or an entity that is not a Party to this Agreement and is not employed by, contracted with, whether directly or through a subcontract of any level, or otherwise retained by a Party to act for or on the Party's behalf. The provisions of this Article shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 6 DISPUTE RESOLUTION.

The Parties shall meet and confer in good faith to resolve any disputes between them arising out of, resulting from, or relating to this Agreement. During any dispute, the Parties shall continue to perform this Agreement as FCSS directs without prejudice to a final determination. During a dispute regarding payment under this Agreement, the Payor Party shall pay the Payee Party the amount that is undisputed and due to the Payee Party; if a disputed amount is finally determined to be due to the Payee Party, the Payor Party shall pay such amount to the Payee Party within 30 days of the final determination. Except for an action to preserve the status quo and/or prevent irreparable harm, a Party shall not commence any cause of action, action, lawsuit, or proceeding arising out of, resulting from, or relating to this Agreement until after complying with this Article. The provisions of this Article shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 7 GENERAL PROVISIONS.

SECTION 7.1 ENTIRE AGREEMENT, CONFLICTS, EXECUTION, AMENDMENT, AND WAIVER. This Agreement is a complete and exclusive statement of the Parties' agreement under Code of Civil Procedure section 1856. This Agreement consists of and any conflicts or inconsistencies in this Agreement shall be resolved by giving precedence as follows: the Cover, these General Terms and Conditions, Required Documents marked as required on the Cover, any exhibit or attachment that is stated on the Cover, and any amendment entered into by the Parties in accordance with this Section. The Parties may execute this Agreement and any amendment hereto in counterparts such that each Party's signature is on a separate page. A copy or an original of this Agreement with the Parties' signatures, whether original or transmitted by electronic means, shall be deemed a fully executed contract. The Parties may amend or waive any covenant, term, or condition of this Agreement only by a writing executed by them.

SECTION 7.2 INTERPRETATION, APPLICABLE LAWS AND TIME ZONE, VENUE, SEVERABILITY, AND SURVIVAL OF TERMINATION. This Agreement is to be interpreted according to its fair meaning and not strictly for or against any Party, and under California laws without giving effect to California's choice of law provisions that may result in the application of the laws of another jurisdiction. All dates and times stated in this Agreement shall be according to Pacific Time. All causes of action, actions, lawsuits, and proceedings arising out of, resulting from, or relating to this Agreement shall be adjudicated in state or federal court in Fresno County, California, provided that FCSS does not hereby waive any immunity to suit. If a court of competent jurisdiction holds any provision of this Agreement void, illegal, or unenforceable, this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and shall be interpreted as though such invalidated provision is not a part of this Agreement and the remaining provisions shall be construed to preserve the Parties' intent in this Agreement. Any provision in this Agreement that by its nature applies after, or is specifically stated to survive, the termination of this Agreement shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

SECTION 7.3 INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR, ASSIGNMENT, AND TRANSFER. Each Party is an independent contractor, and it and its officers, employees, and agents are not, and shall not represent themselves as, officers, employees, or agents of the other Party. This Agreement does not and shall not be construed to create an agency relationship, partnership, or joint venture between the Parties. A Party shall not assign or transfer any or all of its obligations and/or rights under this Agreement, including by operation of law or change of control or merger, without the other Party's' prior written consent; however, this provision shall not be read or construed to prohibit FCSS from contracting with one or more third parties to provide all or a part of the services required from FCSS under this Agreement.

SECTION 7.4 NOTICES. Except as may be specifically stated otherwise in this Agreement, each Party shall give any notices, demands, invoices, and all other communications required or permitted under this Agreement in writing and by one of the following methods to the other Party at the address, FAX number, and/or email stated on the Cover, delivery to be effective upon receipt thereof by the other Party: (A) hand delivery; (B) sent by a reputable overnight courier services that tracks the delivery; (C) sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, first class postage prepaid; or (D) sent by regular mail and transmitted by facsimile or e-mail; and, if to FCSS, a copy thereof, not to include invoices and communications regarding normal implementation of this Agreement, by facsimile to: Lead Legal Counsel at (559) 265-3054. A Party may change its contact person and/or contact information stated on the Cover by notifying the other Party of the particular change and the effective date thereof in accordance with this Section. The provisions of this Section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

The Madera County Public Health Department has been awarded grant funds from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to implement the Community Transformation Grant (CTG) program to combat health disparities and chronic illness by empowering local communities to address social determinants of health. The places where we live, work, study, play and shop affect our health. We all benefit when these places offer better food and drink choices and enable us to be more active while providing us with air that is free of secondhand smoke and health services that fit our needs. By developing evidence-based systemic and environmental changes that are tailored for the realities of rural communities, we will help improve the quality of life and reduce chronic disease for all Maderans, especially those who have long suffered an unfair burden. CTG has four strategic areas: Smoke—Free Multi—Unit Housing, Reducing Consumption of Sugary Beverages, Chronic Disease Self-Management Program (CDSMP), and lastly Safe Routes to School. While our efforts will focus on implementing these four strategic directions, we will identify opportunities to integrate these targeted efforts to create a comprehensive and sustainable model of community-based prevention that maximizes health outcomes.

Purpose

The purpose of this MOU is to ensure cooperation and collaboration between the Madera County Public Health Department and Madera Unified School District so that an optimal number of students, parents, and school staff can be served under the CTG program. It is anticipated that our grant will be serving Madera County residents during fiscal years 2011-16.

CTG Vision

"Everyone living and working in small communities will be able to live healthier lives as healthy places become the norm."

Activity Coordination

The following activities, by agency, are proposed under this Memorandum of Understanding.

Madera County Public Health Department:

Madera County Public Health Department will create educational activities related to the four strategic directions for parents and students, provide information and education at PTA meetings, participate in school wellness policy work activities, participate in school health fairs, conduct health assessment surveys, and collaborate with community-based organizations. Madera County Public Health Department staff will coordinate activities with school principals and other designated school personnel.

Madera Unified School District:

Madera Unified School District staff will collaborate and participate in activities pertinent to CTG's program scope of work in coordination with Madera County Public Health Department staff.

Term of the Agreement

This Memorandum of Understanding made between the Madera County Public Health Department and Madera Unified School District is for the Federal Fiscal Year 2013-2014, effective from the date of approval, and may be extended by the written approval of both agencies.

Educational Resource Consultants (ERC) will provide data analysis and reporting for After School Programs for school year 2013-14.

Required Data:

- Student identification numbers (SSID).
- Demographics of all student attendees (gender, ethnicity, NSLP, grade level, English Learner designation
- Student data from the annual Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) program. This includes the California Standards Test English-Language Arts and Mathematics portions.

Each "After School Program Report Card" will include easy-to-read charts, graphs and tables that show the following comparisons.

- Overall number of after school participants.
- Gender, ethnic, grade level, and English learner composition of after school participants compared to non-participants within the current school year.

- The percentage of after school participants who fall within each of five after school attendance categories (1-29 days, 30-59 days, 60-89 days, 90-119 days, and 120 days or more).
- The mean number of days the average after school participant attends the after school program (overall and by grade level).
- Mean changes in after school participants regular day attendance over the previous year (by after school attendance category).
- Mean CST English-language arts scale scores of after school participants by attendance category (also compared to non-participants).
- Percentage of students scoring proficient or advanced on the CST in English-language arts by after school attendance category (also compared to non-participants).
- Mean math scale scores of after school participants by attendance category (also compared to non-participants).
- Percentage of students scoring proficient or advanced on the CST in math by after school attendance category (also compared to non-participants).
- The percentage of after school participants who decrease, maintain, or increase their CST performance band in English-language arts and math when compared to the previous year. These percentages will be compared to changes in CST performance band of non-participants.

Reporting

Reports will be completed and submitted to the Madera Unified School District within 60 days following receipt of all required data. Background/ rationale:

The Financial Report is provided to the Board on a monthly basis to insure that the Board is aware of the current financial status of the District. It is comprised of a Combined Balance Sheet of all funds, General Fund Cash Flow Statement, and pie charts of the General Fund Revenue and Expenditure Budgets. The report is also used as a tool for the Board and Administrators to aid in making necessary financial decisions to meet the goals of the District.

The Combined Balance Sheet provides a snapshot of the District's current assets, liabilities, and ending fund balance for each Fund. In accordance with GASB 54 the ending fund balance is classified as follows: Nonspendable, Restricted, Committed, Assigned, and Unassigned.

In the General Fund the "Unassigned" fund balance, as defined by GASB 54, reflects the residual balance that has not been assigned to other funds and that is not restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes. The District's 3% required Reserve for Economic Uncertainty (REU) is included in the General Fund "Unassigned" ending fund balance classification.

The Cash Flow Statement is a statement of General Fund actual revenues, expenditures, and cash balance through July 31, 2013 and projected revenues, expenditures, and cash balance through June 30, 2014.

The pie charts represent the % General Fund Revenue by funding source and the % General Fund Expenditures salaries and benefits compared to the all other operating expenses.

Community Relations

Uniform Complaint Procedure

The Governing Board recognizes that the District has the primary responsibility for complying with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The District shall investigate and seek to resolve any complaints alleging failure to comply with such laws and/or alleging unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying in accordance with the uniform complaint procedures.

The District shall use the Uniform Complaint Procedures to resolve any complaint alleging unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying in district programs and activities based on actual or perceived characteristics of race or ethnicity, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, or any other characteristic identified in Education Code 200 and 220, Penal Code 422.55, or Government Code-11135, or based on association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

The Uniform Complaint Procedure shall also be used to address any complaints alleging the district's failure to comply with the prohibition against requiring students to pay fees, deposits, or other charges for participation in educational activities, the requirements for the adoption of a school safety plan, and state and/or federal laws in adult education programs, consolidated categorical aid programs, migrant education, career technical and technical education and training programs, child care and development programs, child nutrition programs, special education programs.

Preference for Early Informal Resolution of Complaints

The Board encourages the early, informal resolution of complaints at the site level whenever possible. The Board believes that the community is more efficiently served by authorizing the site principal or program manager to address complaints informally and promptly. Therefore, a complainant shall be given the option of pursuing an informal resolution of her/his complaint at the site level.

If the complainant does not wish to pursue an informal resolution of her/his complaint at the site level, or in instances in which the complainant is dissatisfied with the findings, conclusions, or response of the site principal or of the program manager when handled informally, the complainant may file a complaint in accordance with the Uniform Complaint Procedures.

In those circumstances in which the site principal or program manager has become a subject of the complaint, the direct supervisor shall oversee the informal resolution of the complaint.

The district's Williams uniform complaint procedures, AR 1312.4, shall be used to investigate and resolve any complaint related to the following:

- 1. Sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials
- 2. Emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health or safety of students or staff
- 3. Teacher vacancies and misassignment
- 4. Deficiency in the district's provision of instruction and/or services to any student who, by the completion of grade 12, has not passed one or both parts of the high school exit examination.

Confidentiality

In investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved and the integrity of the process shall be protected. As appropriate for any complaint alleging discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, the Superintendent or designee may keep the identity

of a complainant confidential to the extent that the investigation of the complaint is not obstructed.

Protection from Retaliation

The Board prohibits retaliation in any form for participating in complaint procedures, including but not limited to the filing of a complaint or the reporting of instances of discrimination. Such participation shall not in any way affect the status, grades or work assignments of the complainant or any individual associated with the complainant.

Third Party Mediation

Legal Reference:

The Board recognizes that a neutral mediator can often suggest a compromise that is agreeable to all parties to a dispute. In accordance with the Uniform Complaint Procedure, whenever all parties to a complaint agree to try and resolve a complaint through mediation, the Superintendent or designee shall initiate mediation. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that mediation results are consistent with state and federal laws and regulations.

Availability of Complaint Forms

Complaint forms are available at the following locations in these District Offices: Chief Academic Office, Human Resources, Educational Services, Student Services, State and Federal Projects, Business Services, and Maintenance and Operations. Forms are also available at all school sites. A complaint may be written and submitted without the use of the form. The completed form must be turned in to the Office of the Chief Academic Officer for processing.

Uniform Complaint Procedures

Except as the Governing Board may otherwise specifically provide in other Board policies, the uniform complaint procedures shall be used only to investigate and resolve complaints alleging violations of federal or state laws or regulations governing specific educational programs, the prohibition against requiring students to pay fees, deposits, or other charges for participating in educational activities, and unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, as specified in accompanying Board policy.

The district's uniform complaint procedures policy and administrative regulation shall be posted in all district schools and offices, including staff lounges and student government meeting rooms. If 15 percent or more of students enrolled in a particular district school speak a single primary language other than English, the district's policy, regulation, forms, and notices concerning uniform complaint procedures shall be translated into that language. (Education Code 234.1, 48985)

(cf. 5145.6 Parental Notification)

The following general principles are to be followed to ensure that complainants are connected with the appropriate District personnel and to ensure that the appropriate procedures are used:

- 1. Employees or community members shall contact site principals and program managers with concerns of any kind.
- 2. Employees or community members shall direct complainants to the Chief Academic Officer when complainants register their concerns at the District Office.
- 3. In all cases in which the Uniform Complaint Procedures are applicable, site principals, program managers, and the Office of the Chief Academic Officer shall take the following actions:
 - a. Advise the complainant of her/his right to invoke the formal Uniform Complaint Procedure, including those instances in which successful resolution at the informal level appears likely.
 - b. Provide complainants with a copy of the Uniform Complaint Procedures form and offer assistance in filling out the form as needed.

- c. Advise complainants that all Uniform Complaint Procedures forms are submitted to the Office of the Chief Academic Officer.
- 4. The Office of the Chief Academic Officer is responsible for all of the following activities:
 - a. Intake and logging of complaints.
 - b. Assignment of the complaints to the appropriate compliance officer.
 - c. Monitoring cases through their resolution, including any possible appeals.
 - d. Maintenance of all records pertaining to each case.

Compliance Officers

Knowledge Regarding Laws and Programs

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that employees designated to investigate complaints are knowledgeable about the laws and programs for which they are responsible. Designated employees may have access to legal counsel as determined by the Superintendent or designee.

(cf. 9124 Attorney)

Notification

The Superintendent or designee shall annually provide written notification of the district's uniform complaint procedures to students, employees, parents/guardians, the district advisory committee, school advisory committees, appropriate private school officials or representatives, and other interested parties. (Education Code 262.3, 49013; 5 CCR 4622)

(cf. 0420 School Plans/Site Councils) (cf. 1220 Citizen Advisory Committees) (cf. 3260 Fees and Charges) (cf. 4112.9/4212.9/4312.9 Employee Notifications) (cf. 5145.6 Parental Notifications)

The notice shall:

- 1. Identify the person(s), position(s), or unit(s) responsible for receiving complaints.
- 2. Advise the complainant of any civil law remedies that may be available to him/her under state or federal discrimination laws, if applicable.
- 3. Advise the complainant of the appeal process, including, if applicable, the complainant's right to take a complaint directly to the California Department of Education (CDE) or to pursue remedies before civil courts or other public agencies.

4. Include statements that:

- a. The district has the primarily responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs.
- b. The complaint review shall be completed within 60 calendar days from the date of receipt of the complaint unless the complainant agrees in writing to an extension of the timeline.
- c. A complaint alleging unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying must be filed not later than six months from the date it occurred, or six months from the date the complainant first obtained-knowledge of the facts of the alleged discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying.
- d. The complainant has a right to appeal the district's decision to the CDE by filing a written appeal within 15 days of receiving the district's decision.
- e. The appeal to the CDE must include a copy of the complaint filed with the district and a copy of the district's decision.
- f. Copies of the district's uniform complaint procedures are available free of charge.

Procedures

All complaints shall be investigated and resolved within 60 calendar days of the district's receipt of the complaint. (5 CCR 4631)

Compliance officers shall maintain a record of each complaint and subsequent related actions, including all information required for compliance with 5 CCR 4631 and 4633.

All parties involved in allegations shall be notified when a complaint is filed, when a complaint meeting or hearing is scheduled and when a decision or ruling is made.

Step 1: Filing of Complaint

Any individual, public agency or organization may file a written complaint of the district's alleged noncompliance with federal or state laws or regulations governing educational programs. (5 CCR 4630)

A complaint concerning unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, may be filed only by a person who alleges that he/she person suffered unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying or by a person who believes that an individual or any specific class of individuals has been subjected to it. The complaint shall be initiated no later than six months from the date when the alleged discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying occurred, or six months from the date when the complainant first obtained knowledge of the facts of the alleged discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying. However, upon written request by the complainant, the Superintendent or designee may extend the filing period for up to 90 calendar days. (5 CCR 4630)

A complaint alleging noncompliance with the law regarding the prohibition against requiring students to pay student fees, deposits, and charges may be filed anonymously if the complaint provides evidence or information leading to evidence to support an allegation of noncompliance. (Education Code 49013)

The complaint shall be presented to the compliance officer who shall maintain a log of complaints received, providing each with a code number and a date stamp.

If a complainant is unable to put a complaint in writing due to conditions such as a disability or illiteracy, district staff shall assist him/her in the filing of the complaint. (5 CCR 4600)

Step 2: Mediation

Within three business days of receiving the complaint, the compliance officer may informally discuss with all the parties the possibility of using mediation. If the parties agree to mediation, the compliance officer shall make all arrangements for this process.

Before initiating the mediation of a complaint alleging discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, the compliance officer shall ensure that all parties agree to make the mediator a party to related confidential information.

If the mediation process does not resolve the problem within the parameters of law, the compliance officer shall proceed with his/her investigation of the complaint.

The use of mediation shall not extend the district's timelines for investigating and resolving the complaint unless the complainant agrees in writing to such an extension of time. (5 CCR 4631)

Step 3: Investigation of Complaint

Within 10 calendar days of receiving the complaint, the compliance officer shall provide the complainant and/or his/her representative an opportunity to present the complaint and any

evidence, or information leading to evidence, to support the allegations in the complaint. The compliance officer also shall collect all documents and interview all witnesses with information pertinent to the complaint.

A complainant's refusal to provide the district's investigator with documents or other evidence related to the allegations in the complaint, failure or refusal to cooperate in the investigation or engagement in any other obstruction of the investigation may result in the dismissal of the complaint because of a lack of evidence to support the allegation. (5 CCR 4631)

In accordance with law, the district shall provide the investigator with access to records and other information related to the allegation in the complaint and shall not in any way obstruct the investigation. Failure or refusal of the district to cooperate in the investigation may result in a finding based on evidence collected that a violation has occurred and in the imposition of a remedy in favor of the complainant. (5 CCR 4631)

Step 4: Response

Within 30 calendar days of receiving the complaint, the compliance officer shall prepare and send to the complainant a written report of the district's investigation and decision, as described in Step #5 below. If the complainant is dissatisfied with the compliance officer's decision, he/she may, within five business days, file his/her complaint in writing with the Board.

The Board may consider the matter at its next regular Board meeting or at a special Board meeting convened in order to meet the 60-day time limit within which the complaint must be answered. The Board may decide not to hear the complaint, in which case the compliance officer's decision shall be final.

If the Board hears the complaint, the compliance officer shall send the Board's decision to the complainant within 60 calendar days of the district's initial receipt of the complaint or within the time period that has been specified in a written agreement with the complainant. (5 CCR 4631)

Step 5: Final Written Decision

The district's decision shall be in writing and sent to the complainant. (5 CCR 4631)

The district's decision shall be written in English and, when required by Education Code 48985, in the complainant's primary language.

For all complaints, the decision shall include: (5 CCR 4631)

- 1. The findings of fact based on the evidence gathered
- 2. The conclusion(s) of law

- 3. Disposition of the complaint
- 4. Rationale for such disposition
- 5. Corrective actions, if any are warranted
- 6. Notice of the complainant's right to appeal the district's decision within 15 calendar days to the California Department of Education and procedures to be followed for initiating such an appeal.

In addition, any decision concerning a discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying complaint based on state laws shall include a notice that the complainant must wait until 60 calendar days have elapsed from the filing of an appeal with the CDE before pursuing civil law remedies. (Education Code 262.3)

If an investigation of a complaint results in discipline to a student or an employee, the decision shall simply state that effective action was taken and that the student or employee was informed of district expectations. The report shall not give any further information as to the nature of the disciplinary action.

If the complaint alleging noncompliance with the laws regarding student fees, deposits, and other charges is found to have merit, the district shall provide a remedy to all affected students and parents/guardians, which, where applicable, shall include reasonable efforts to ensure full reimbursement to them. (Education Code 49013)

Appeals to the California Department of Education

If dissatisfied with the district's decision, the complainant may appeal in writing to the CDE. (Education Code 49012; 5 CCR 4632)

The complainant shall file his/her appeal within 15 days of receiving the district's decision and the appeal shall specify the basis for the appeal of the decision and whether the facts are incorrect and/or the law has been misapplied. The appeal shall be accompanied by a copy of the locally filed complaint and a copy of the district's decision. (5 CCR 4632)

Upon notification by the CDE that the complainant has appealed the district's decision, the Superintendent or designee shall forward the following documents to the CDE: (5 CCR 4633)

- 1. A copy of the original complaint.
- 2. A copy of the district's decision.
- 3. A summary of the nature and extent of the investigation conducted by the district, if not covered by the decision.

- 4. A copy of the investigation file, including but not limited to, all notes, interviews, and documents submitted by the parties and gathered by the investigator.
- 5. A report of any action taken to resolve the complaint.
- 6. A copy of the district's uniform complaint procedures.
- 7. Other relevant information requested by the CDE.

The California Department of Education may directly intervene in a complaint without waiting for action by the district when one of the conditions listed in 5 CCR 4650 exists, including when the District has not taken action within 60 calendar days of the date the complaint was filed with the district. (5 CCR 4650)

Civil Law Remedies

A complainant may pursue available civil law remedies outside of the district's complaint procedures. Complainants may seek assistance from mediation centers or public/private interest attorneys. Civil law remedies that may be imposed by a court include, but are not limited to, injunctions and restraining orders.

For complaints alleging discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying based on state law, a complainant shall wait until 60 calendar days have elapsed from the filing of an appeal with the California Department of Education before pursuing civil law remedies, provided the district has appropriately and in a timely manner apprised the complainant of his/her right to file a complaint in accordance with 5 CCR 4622. The moratorium does not apply to injunctive relief and to discrimination complaints based on federal law. (Education Code 262.3)

Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures

Community Relations

Cautionary Notice: As added and amended by SBX3 4 (Ch. 12, Third Extraordinary Session, Statutes of 2009), ABX4 2 (Ch. 2, Fourth Extraordinary Session, Statutes of 2009), and SB 70 (Ch. 7, Statutes of 2011), Education Code 42605 grants districts flexibility in "Tier 3" categorical programs. The Madera Unified School District has accepted this flexibility and thus is deemed in compliance with the statutory or regulatory program and funding requirements for these programs for the 2008-09 through 2014-15 fiscal years. As a result, the district may temporarily suspend certain provisions of the following policy or regulation that reflect these requirements. For further information, please contact the Superintendent or designee.

Types of Complaints

The District shall use the following procedures to investigate and resolve complaints when the complainant alleges that any of the following has occurred: (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4681, 4682, 4683)

- 1. Textbooks and instructional materials
- a. A pupil, including an English learner, does not have standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials or state- or district-adopted textbooks or other require instructional materials to use in class.
- b. A pupil does not have access to textbooks or instructional materials to use at home or after school. This does not require two sets of textbooks or instructional materials for each pupil.
- c. Textbooks or instructional materials are in poor or unusable condition, have missing pages, or are unreadable due to damage.
- d. A pupil was provided photocopied sheets from only a portion of a textbook or instructional materials to address a shortage of textbooks or instructional materials.

(cf. 6161.1 - Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials)

- 2. Teacher vacancy or misassignment
- a. A semester begins and a teacher vacancy exists.
- b. A teacher who lacks credentials or training to teach English learners is assigned to teach a class with more than 20 percent English learner pupils in the class.

(cf. 4112.22 - Staff Teaching pupils of Limited English Proficiency)

AR 1312.4(b)

c. A teacher is assigned to teach a class for which the teacher lacks subject matter competency.

Teacher vacancy means a position to which a single designated certificated employee has not been assigned at the beginning of the year for an entire year or, if the position is for a one-semester course, a position to which a single designated certificated employee has not been assigned at the beginning of the semester for an entire semester. (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4600)

Beginning of the year or semester means the first day classes necessary to serve all the pupils enrolled are established with a single designated certificated employee assigned for the duration of the class, but not later than 20 working days after the first day pupils attend classes for that semester. (5 CCR 4600)

Misassignment means the placement of a certificated employee in a teaching or services position for which the employee does not hold a legally recognized certificate or credential or the placement of a certificated employee in a teaching or services position that the employee is not otherwise authorized by statute to hold. (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4600)

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- 3. Facilities
- a. A condition poses an emergency or urgent threat to the health or safety of pupils or staff.

Emergency or urgent threat means structures or systems that are in a condition that poses a threat to the health and safety of pupils or staff while at school, including, but not limited to, gas leaks; nonfunctioning heating, ventilation, fire sprinklers, or air-conditioning systems; electrical power failure; major sewer line stoppage; major pest or vermin infestation; broken windows or exterior doors or gates that will not lock and that pose a security risk; abatement of hazardous materials previously undiscovered that pose an immediate threat to pupils or staff; or structural damage creating a hazardous or uninhabitable condition; or any other condition deemed appropriate. (Education Code 17592.72)

b. A school restroom has not been cleaned, maintained, or kept open in accordance with Education Code 35292.5.

Clean or maintained school restroom means a school restroom has been cleaned or maintained regularly, is fully operational, or has been stocked at all times with toilet paper, soap, and paper towels or functional hand dryers. (Education Code 35292.5)

Open restroom means the school has kept all restrooms open during school hours when pupils are not in classes and has kept a sufficient number of restrooms open during school hours when pupils are in classes. This does not apply when the temporary closing of the restroom is necessary for pupil safety or to make repairs. (Education Code 35292.5)

4. High school exit examination intensive instruction and services

A pupil, including an English learner, who has not passed the exit exam by the end of grade 12 was not provided the opportunity to receive intensive instruction and services pursuant to Education Code 37254(d)(4) and (5) after completion of grade 12 for two consecutive academic years or until the pupil has passed both parts of the exam, whichever comes first. (Education Code 35186)

(cf. 6162.52 - High School Exit Examination) (cf. 6179 - Supplemental Instruction)

Filing of Complaint

A complaint alleging any condition(s) specified in items #1-3 in the section entitled "Types of Complaints" above shall be filed with the principal or designee at the school in which the complaint arises. The principal or designee shall forward a complaint about problems beyond his/her authority to the Superintendent or designee in a timely manner, but not to exceed 10 working days. (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4680)

A complaint alleging any deficiency specified in item #4 in the section entitled "Types of Complaints" above shall be filed with a district official designated by the Superintendent. Such complaints may be filed at the district office or school site and shall be immediately forwarded to the Superintendent or designee. (Education Code 35186)

Investigation and Response

The principal or designee shall make all reasonable efforts to investigate any problem within his/her authority. He/she shall remedy a valid complaint within a reasonable time period not to exceed 30 working days from the date the complaint was received. (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4685)

Complaints may be filed anonymously. If the complainant has indicated on the complaint form that he/she would like a response to the complaint, the principal or designee shall report the resolution of the complaint to him/her within 45 working days of the initial filing of the complaint. If a response is requested, the response shall be made to the mailing address of the complainant as indicated on the complaint form. At the same time, the principal or designee shall report the same information to the Superintendent or designee. (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4680, 4685)

When Education Code 48985 is applicable and the complainant has requested a response, the response shall be written in English and in the primary language in which the complaint was filed. (Education Code 35186)

If a complainant is not satisfied with the resolution of a complaint, he/she has the right to describe the complaint to the Governing Board of Education at a regularly scheduled meeting. (*Education Code 35186*; 5 CCR 4686)

For any complaint concerning a facilities condition that poses an emergency or urgent threat to the health or safety of pupils or staff as described in item #3a in the section entitled "Types of Complaints" above, a complainant who is not satisfied with the resolution proffered by the principal or Superintendent or designee may file an appeal to the Superintendent of Public Instruction within 15 days of receiving the district's response. The complainant shall comply with the appeal requirements specified in 5 CCR 4632. (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4687)

All complaints and written responses shall be public records. (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4686)

(cf. 1340 - Access to District Records)

Reports

The Superintendent or designee shall report summarized data on the nature and resolution of all complaints to the Board of Education and the County Superintendent of Schools on a quarterly basis. The report shall include the number of complaints by general subject area with the number of resolved and unresolved complaints. These summaries shall be publicly reported on a quarterly basis at a regularly scheduled Board meeting. (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4686)

Forms and Notices

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure a Williams complaint form is available at each school. However, complainants need not use the district's complaint form in order to file a complaint. (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4680)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's complaint form contains a space to indicate whether the complainant desires a response to his/her complaint and specifies the location for filing a complaint. A complainant may add as much text to explain the complaint as he/she wishes. (Education Code 35186; 5 CCR 4680)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that a notice is posted in each classroom in each school containing the components specified in Education Code 35186. (Education Code 35186)

Student Wellness

The Governing Board recognizes the link between student health and learning and desires to provide a comprehensive program promoting healthy eating and physical activity for District students. The Superintendent or designee coordinate and align district efforts to support student wellness through health education, physical education and activity, health services, nutrition services, psychological and counseling services, and a safe and healthy school environment. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for promoting staff wellness and for involving parents/guardians and the community in reinforcing students' understanding and appreciation of the importance of a healthy lifestyle.

The Superintendent or designee shall encourage parents/guardians, students, food service employees, physical education teachers, school health professionals, Board members, school administrators, and members of the public to participate in the development, implementation, and periodic review and update the district's student wellness policy (42 USC 1758b)

The school wellness committee meets as part of the "Wellness Committee." The committee consists of parents/guardians of students, school food professionals, school administrators, Board representatives, members of the public, elementary physical education department, school nurses, and community members.

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The wellness committee shall advise the District on health-related issues, activities, policies, and programs. At the discretion of the Superintendent or designee, the council's charge(s) may

include the planning and implementation of activities to promote health within the school or community.

Goals for Nutrition, Physical Activity, and Other Wellness Activities

The Board shall adopt goals for nutrition promotion and education, physical activity, and other school-based activities that promote student wellness. (42 USC 1751)

In compliance with The Alliance for a Healthier Generation guidelines, the Board directs that The Alliance for a Healthier Generation guidelines shall model all District wellness activities and procedures. The guidelines are inclusive as Exhibit 5030.

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The District's nutrition education and physical education programs shall be based on research, shall be consistent with the expectations established in the state's curriculum frameworks and content standards, and shall be designed to build the skills and knowledge that all students need to maintain a healthy lifestyle.

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All students in grades K-12 shall be provided opportunities to be physically active on a regular basis. 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The Superintendent or designee shall encourage staff to serve as positive role models. He/she shall promote and may provide opportunities for regular physical activity among employees. Professional development may include instructional strategies that assess health knowledge and skills and promote healthy behaviors.

Nutritional Guidelines for Foods Available at School

For all foods available on each campus during the school day, the district shall adopt nutritional guidelines which are consistent with 42 USC 1773 and 1779 and federal regulations and which support the objectives of promoting student health and reducing childhood obesity. (42 USC 1758b).

In order to maximize the district's ability to provide nutritious meals and snacks, all district schools shall participate in available federal school nutrition programs, including the National School Lunch and School Breakfast programs and after-school snack programs, to the extent possible. When approved by the California Department of Education, the district may sponsor a summer meal program.

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The Superintendent or designee shall provide access to free, potable water during meal times in the food service area in accordance with Education Code 38086 and 42 USC 1758, and shall encourage students' consumption of water by educating them about the health benefits of water and serving water in an appealing manner.

The Board believes that all foods and beverages sold to students at District schools, including those available outside the districts food services program, should support the health curriculum and promote optimal health. Nutritional standards adopted by the district for food and beverages provided through student stores, vending machines, or other venues, shall meet or exceed state and federal nutritional standards.

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The Superintendent or designee shall encourage school organizations to use healthy food items or non-food items for fundraising purposes. He/she also shall encourage school staff to avoid the use of non-nutritious foods as a reward for students' academic performance, accomplishments, or classroom behavior.

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School staff shall encourage parents/guardians or other volunteers to support the District's nutrition education program by considering nutritional quality when selecting any snacks which they may donate for occasional class parties and by limiting foods or beverages that do not meet

nutritional standards to no more than one such food or beverage per party. Class parties or celebrations shall be held after the lunch period when possible.

Guidelines for Reimbursable Meals

Foods and beverages provided through federally reimbursable school meal programs shall meet or exceed federal regulations and guidance issued pursuant to 42 USC 1758(f)(1), 1766(a), and 1779(a) and (b), as they apply to schools. (42 USC 1751 Note)

In order to maximize the District's ability to provide nutritious meals and snacks, all District schools shall participate in available federal school nutrition programs, including the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, to the extent possible.

Program Implementation and Evaluation

The Superintendent shall designate one or more district or school employees, as appropriate, to ensure that each school site complies with this policy (42 USC 175b)

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The Superintendent or designee shall assess the implementation and effectiveness of this policy at least once every two years.

The assessment shall include the extent to which district schools are in compliance with this policy, the extent to which this policy compares to model wellness policies available from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and a description of the progress made in attaining the goals of the wellness policy (42 USC 1758b)

The Board and the Superintendent or designee shall establish indicators that will be used to measure implementation and effectiveness of the district activities related to student wellness. Such indicators may include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Descriptions of the District's nutrition education, physical education, and health education curricula and the extent to which they align with state academic content standards and legal requirements.
- 2. Number of minutes of physical education instruction offered at each grade span, and the estimated percentage of class time spent in moderate to vigorous physical activity
- 3. Results of the state's physical fitness test at applicable grade levels

- 4. An analysis of the nutritional content of meals and snacks served in all district programs, based on a sample of menus and production records.
- 5. Student participation rates in school meal programs, including the number of students enrolled in the free and reduced-price meals program compared to the number of students eligible for that program.
- 6. Extent to which foods sold on campus outside the food services program, such as through vending machines, student stores, or fundraisers, comply with nutritional standards.
- 7. Any other indicators recommended by the Superintendent and approved by the Board

The Superintendent or designee shall invite feedback on district and school wellness report to the Board at least every two years on the implementation of this policy and any other Board policies related to nutrition and physical activity.

Posting Requirements

Each school shall post the District's policies and regulations on nutrition and physical activity in public view within all school cafeterias or in other central eating areas. (Education Code 49432)

Bullying

Students

The Governing Board recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student learning and school attendance and desires to provide safe school environments that protect students from physical and emotional harm. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student.

No student or group of students shall, through physical, written, verbal, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any other student or school personnel.

Cyberbullying includes the transmission of harassing communications, direct threats, or other harmful texts, sounds, or images on the Internet, social media, or other technologies using a telephone, computer, or any wireless communication device. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation.

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Strategies for bullying prevention and intervention shall be developed with involvement of key stakeholders in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation governing the development of comprehensive safety plans and shall be incorporated into such plans.

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Bullying Prevention

To the extent possible, district and school strategies shall focus on prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and strategies to establish a positive, collaborative school climate. Students shall be informed, through student handbooks and other appropriate means, of district and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for perpetrators of bullying.

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School staff shall receive related professional development, including information about early warning signs of harassing/intimidating behaviors and effective prevention and intervention strategies.

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Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, cafeterias.

Intervention

Students are encouraged to notify school staff when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of victims and perpetrators. He/she also may involve school counselors, mental health counselors, and/or law enforcement.

Complaints and Investigation

Students may submit to a teacher or administrator a verbal or written complaint of conduct they consider to be bullying. Complaints of bullying shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with the district's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

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When a student is reported to be engaging in bullying off campus, the Superintendent or designee shall investigate and document the activity and shall identify specific facts or circumstances that explain the impact or potential impact on school activity, school attendance, or the targeted student's educational performance.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated.

When a student uses a social networking site or service to bully or harass another student, the Superintendent or designee shall file a request with the networking site or service to suspend the privileges of the student and to have the material removed.

Discipline

Any student who engages in bullying on school premises, or off campus in a manner that causes or is likely to cause a substantial disruption of a school activity or school attendance, shall be subject to discipline, which may include suspension or expulsion, in accordance with district policies and regulations.

Nondiscrimination/Harassment

Students

The Governing Board desires to provide a safe school environment that allows all students equal access and opportunities in the district's academic and other educational support programs, services, and activities. The Board prohibits, at any district school or school activity, unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying of any student based on the student's actual race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, or gender expression; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

Prohibited discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying includes physical, verbal, nonverbal, or written conduct based on one of the categories listed above that is so severe and pervasive that it affects a student's ability to participate in or benefit from an educational program or activity; creates an intimidating, threatening, hostile, or offensive educational environment; has the effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with a student's academic performance; or otherwise adversely affects a student's educational opportunities.

The Board also prohibits any form of retaliation against any student who files a complaint or report regarding an incident of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide age-appropriate training and information to students, parents/guardians, and employees regarding discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying, including, but not limited to, the district's nondiscrimination policy, what constitutes prohibited behavior, how to report incidents, and to whom such reports should be made.

Any employee who permits or engages in prohibited discrimination, harassment, intimidation, bullying, or retaliation shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

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Any student who feels that he/she has been subjected to discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying should immediately contact the Coordinator, the principal, or any other staff member. In addition, any student who observes any such incident should report the incident to the Coordinator or principal, whether or not the victim files a complaint.

Any school employee who observes an incident of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying or to whom such an incident is reported shall report the incident to the Coordinator or principal, whether or not the victim files a complaint

In addition, the employee shall immediately intervene when safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

Upon receiving a complaint of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, the Coordinator shall immediately investigate the complaint in accordance with the district's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the student handbook clearly describes the district's nondiscrimination policy, procedures for filing a complaint regarding discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, and the resources that are available to students who feel that they have been the victim of any such behavior. The district's policy shall also be posted on the district web site or any other location that is easily accessible to students.

Cautionary Notice: As added and amended by SBX3 4 (Ch. 12, Third Extraordinary Session, Statutes of 2009), ABX4 2 (Ch. 2, Fourth Extraordinary Session, Statutes of 2009), and SB 70 (Ch. 7, Statutes of 2011), Education Code 42605 grants districts flexibility in "Tier 3" categorical programs and provides that districts are deemed in compliance with the program and funding requirements for these programs for the 2008-09 through 2014-15 fiscal years. As a result of this flexibility, the district may choose to temporarily suspend certain provisions of the following policy or administrative regulation that reflect those requirements. Students

Child Care And Development

Licensing

All district child care and development services shall be licensed by the California Department of Social Services, unless exempted pursuant to Health and Safety Code 1596.792 or 22 CCR 101158.

The license shall be posted in a prominent, publicly accessible location in the facility. (Health and Safety Code 1596.8555)

Licensed child care centers shall be subject to the requirements of Health and Safety Code 1596.70-1597.21, 22 CCR 101151-101239.2, and, when applicable, 22 CCR 101451-101539.

Program Components

The district's child care and development program shall include the following components:

1. A developmental profile recording each child's physical, cognitive, social, and emotional development which shall be used to plan and conduct developmentally and age-appropriate activities (Education Code 8203.5; 5 CCR 18272)

Program staff shall complete the "Desired Results Developmental Profile," available from the California Department of Education (CDE), for each child who is enrolled in the program for at least 10 hours per week and for any child with disabilities regardless of the number of hours enrolled. The profile shall be completed within 60 days of enrollment and at least once every six months thereafter for children of all ages. (Education Code 8203.5; 5 CCR 18270.5, 18272)

- 2. An educational program which complies with 5 CCR 18273, including the provision of services that are developmentally, linguistically, and culturally appropriate and inclusive of children with special needs

Staffing Ratios

The district's child care and development program shall maintain at least the minimum adult-

child and teacher-child ratios specified in 5 CCR 18290-18292 based on the ages of the children served.

Enrollment

The district's child care and development services shall be available to Preschool age children. Individuals with disabilities may be served through age 21 years in accordance with their individualized education program and Education Code 8208. (Education Code 8208, 8263.4)

Children who meet the criteria specified in Education Code 8250 and 8263 shall be eligible for subsidized child care and development services.

First priority for enrollment shall be given to neglected or abused children who are recipients of child protective services, or children who are at risk of being neglected or abused, upon written referral from a legal, medical, or social services agency. If unable to enroll a child in this category, the district shall refer the child's parent/guardian to local resource and referral services so that services for the child can be located. (Education Code 8263)

Second priority for enrollment shall be given equally to families who are income eligible, as defined in Education Code 8263.1. Families with the lowest gross monthly income in relation to family size shall be admitted first. If two or more families are in the same priority in relation to income, the family that has a child with disabilities shall be admitted first or, if there is no child with disabilities, the family that has been on the waiting list for the longest time shall be admitted first. (Education Code 8263, 8263.1)

The district's decision to approve or deny services shall be communicated to the family through a written notice mailed or delivered within 30 days from the date the application is signed by the parent/guardian. If services are approved, the notice shall contain the basis of eligibility, daily/hourly fee, if applicable, duration of the eligibility, names of children approved to receive services, and the hours of service approved for each day. If services are denied, the notice shall contain the basis of denial and instructions on how the parents/guardians may request a hearing in accordance with the procedures specified in 5 CCR 18120 and 18121 if they do not agree with the district's decision. (5 CCR 18094, 18118)

After all children eligible for subsidized services have been enrolled, the district may enroll children in accordance with any other priorities established by the Governing Board.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a waiting list in accordance with admission priorities and shall contact applicants in order of priority from the waiting list as vacancies occur. (5 CCR 18106)

The Superintendent or designee shall establish and maintain a basic data file for each family receiving child care and development services containing the completed and signed application for services and records used to determine the child's eligibility and need. (5 CCR 18081)

Disenrollment

When necessary due to a reduction in state reimbursements, families shall be disenrolled from subsidized child care and development services in the following order: (Education Code 8263.3)

- 1. Families with the highest income in relation to family size shall be disenrolled first.
- 2. If two or more families have the same income ranking, children without disabilities who have been enrolled in child care services the longest shall be disenrolled first. After all children without disabilities have been disenrolled, children with disabilities shall be disenrolled, with those who have been enrolled in child care services the longest being disenrolled first.
- 3. Families whose children are receiving child protective services or are at risk of neglect, abuse, or exploitation, regardless of family income, shall be disenrolled last.

Fees

Except when prohibited by law, the Superintendent or designee may charge fees for services according to the fee schedule established by the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the actual cost of services, or the maximum daily/hourly rate specified in the contract, whichever is least. (Education Code 8250, 8263, 8447; 5 CCR 18108, 18109, 18110)

Families receiving services on the basis of having a child at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation may be exempt from these fees for up to three months. Families receiving services on the basis of having a child receiving child protective services, or having a certification by a county child welfare agency that child care services continue to be necessary, may be exempt from these fees for up to 12 months. The cumulative period of exemption from these fees for these families shall not exceed 12 months. (Education Code 8263)

Fees shall be collected prior to providing services and shall be considered delinquent after seven days from the date that fees are due. Parents/guardians shall be notified in the event that fees are delinquent. If a reasonable plan for payment of the delinquent fees has not been provided by the parents/guardians, services shall be terminated if all delinquent fees are not paid within two weeks of such notification. Parents/guardians shall receive a copy of the district's regulations regarding fee collection at the time of initial enrollment into the program. (5 CCR 18114, 18115)

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process which includes parents/guardians in determining whether and how much to charge parents/guardians for field trip expenses. This process also shall be used to determine whether to require parents/guardians to provide diapers. (Education Code 8263)

Health Examination

A physical examination and evaluation, including age-appropriate immunization, shall be

required prior to or within six weeks of enrollment, unless the parent/guardian submits a letter stating that such examination is contrary to his/her religious beliefs. (Education Code 8263)

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Attendance

Sign-in and sign-out sheets shall be used daily for all children for attendance accounting purposes. Attendance records shall include verification of excused absences, including the child's name, date(s) of absence, specific reason for absence and signature of parent/guardian or district representative. (5 CCR 18065, 18066)

Absences shall be excused for the following reasons:

- 1. Illness or quarantine of the child or of the parent/guardian (Education Code 8208)
- 2. Family emergency (Education Code 8208)

A family emergency shall be considered to exist when unforeseen circumstances cause the need for immediate action, such as may occur in the event of a natural disaster or when a member of the child's immediate family dies, has an accident, or is required to appear in court.

- 3. Time spent with a parent/guardian or other relative as required by a court of law (Education Code 8208)
- 4. Time spent with a parent/guardian or other relative which is clearly in the best interest of the child (Education Code 8208)

An absence shall be considered to be in the best interest of the child when the time is spent with the child's parent/guardian or other relative for reasons deemed justifiable by the program coordinator or site supervisor.

Except for children who are recipients of child protective services or at risk of abuse or neglect, excused absences in the best interest of the child shall be limited to 10 days during the contract period. (5 CCR 18066)

Any absence due to a reason other than the above, or without the required verification, shall be considered an unexcused absence. After three unexcused absences during the year, the program coordinator or site supervisor shall notify the parents/guardians. Children who continue to have excessive unexcused absences may be removed from the program at the discretion of the program coordinator in order to accommodate other families on the waiting list for admission.

Parents/guardians shall be notified of the policies and procedures related to excused and unexcused absences for child care and development services. (5 CCR 18066)

Rights of Parents/Guardians

At the time a child is accepted into a licensed child care and development center, the child's parent/guardian or authorized representative shall be notified of his/her rights as specified in 22 CCR 101218.1, including, but not limited to, the right to enter and inspect the child care facility and the right to be informed, upon request, of the name and type of association to the center of any adult who has been granted a criminal record exemption. (Health and Safety Code 1596.857; 22 CCR 101218.1)

The written notice of parent/guardian rights also shall be permanently posted within the facility in a location accessible to parents/guardians. Notwithstanding these rights, access to the facility may be denied to an adult whose behavior presents a risk to children present in the facility or to noncustodial parents/guardians when so requested by the responsible parent/guardian. (Health and Safety Code 1596.857)

Records

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records of enrollment, attendance, types of families served, income received from all families participating in the district's child care and development program, and any other records required by the CDE.

Instruction

School Day

The Governing Board shall fix the length of the school day subject to the provisions of law. (Education Code 46100)

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The length of the school day shall apply equally to students with disabilities unless otherwise specified in the student's individualized education program or Section 504 plan.

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In establishing the daily instructional schedule for each secondary school, the Superintendent or designee shall give consideration to course requirements and curricular demands, availability of school facilities, and applicable legal requirements.

The Board encourages flexibility in scheduling so as to provide longer time blocks or class periods when appropriate and desirable to support student learning, provide more intensive study of core academic subjects or extended exploration of complex topics, and reduce transition time between classes.

Prior to implementing a block schedule program in which secondary students attend class for fewer school days, the Board shall consult with the certificated and classified employees of the school in a good faith effort to reach agreement and shall also consult with parents/guardians of the students who would be affected by the change and the community at large. Such consultation shall include at least one public hearing for which the Board has given adequate notice to the employees and to the parents/guardians of affected students. (Education Code 46162)

Instruction

SCHOOL DAY

Kindergarten

Except as otherwise provided by law, the average school day established for kindergarten students shall be at least three hours, including recesses but excluding noon intermissions, but no longer than four hours, excluding recesses. (Education Code 46111, 46114, 46115, 46117)

In any district school operating an early primary program pursuant to Education Code 8970-8974, the kindergarten school day may exceed four hours, excluding recess, if both of the following conditions are met: (Education Code 8973)

- 1. The Governing Board declares that the extended-day kindergarten program does not exceed the length of the primary school day.
- 2. The extended-day kindergarten program includes ample opportunity for both active and quiet activities within an integrated, experiential, and developmentally appropriate educational program.

Grades 1-8

Except as otherwise provided by law, the school day for elementary and middle school students shall be:

- 1. At least 230 minutes for students in grades 1-3, unless the Board has prescribed a shorter school day because of lack of school facilities requiring double sessions, in which case the minimum school day shall be 200 minutes. (Education Code 46112, 46142)
- 2. At least 240 minutes for students in grades 4-8 (Education Code 46113, 46142)

In determining the number of minutes for purposes of compliance with the minimum school day for students in grades 1-8, both noon intermissions and recesses shall be excluded. (Education Code 46115)

Grades 9-12

The school day for students in grades 9-12 shall be at least 240 minutes. (Education Code46141, 46142)

However, the school day may be less than 240 minutes when authorized by law. Programs that have a minimum school day of 180 minutes include, but are not necessarily limited to:

1. Continuation high school or classes (Education Code 46141, 46170)

- 2. Opportunity school or classes (Education Code 46141, 46180)
- 3. Regional occupational center (Education Code 46141, 52325)

A student in grade 12 who is enrolled in work experience education and is in his/her last semester or quarter before graduation may be permitted to attend school for less than 180 minutes per school day if he/she would complete all requirements for graduation, except physical education courses, in less than 180 minutes each day. (Education Code 46147)

5. Concurrent enrollment in a community college pursuant to Education Code 48800-48802 or, for students in grades 11-12, part-time enrollment in classes of the California State University or University of California, provided academic credit will be awarded upon satisfactory completion of enrolled courses (Education Code 46146)

Alternative Block Schedule for Junior High and High Schools

In order to establish a block or other alternative schedule or to accommodate career technical education and regional occupational center/program courses, the district may authorize students to attend fewer than the total number of days in which school is in session provided that students attend classes for at least 1,200 minutes during any five school day period or 2,400 minutes during any 10 school day period. (Education Code 46160)

Instruction

Nonpublic, Nonsectarian School And Agency Services for Special Education

The Governing Board recognizes its responsibility to provide all district students, including students with disabilities, a free appropriate public education in accordance with law. When the district is unable to provide direct special education and/or related services to students with disabilities, the Board may enter into a contract with a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency to meet the students' needs.

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In selecting nonpublic, nonsectarian schools or agencies with which the district may contract for the placement of any district student with disabilities, the Superintendent or designee shall follow the procedures specified in law and accompanying administrative regulation.

Prior to entering into a contract to place any student in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency, the Superintendent or designee shall verify that the school or agency is certified to provide special education and related services to individuals with disabilities in accordance with Education Code 56366. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall monitor, on an ongoing basis, the certification of any nonpublic, nonsectarian school with which the district has a contract to ensure that the school or agency's certification has not expired.

No district student shall be placed in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency unless the student's individualized education program (IEP) team has determined that an appropriate public education alternative does not exist and that the nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency placement is appropriate for the student. In accordance with law, any student with disabilities placed in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency shall have all the rights and protections to which students with disabilities are generally entitled, including, but not limited to, the procedural safeguards, due process rights, and periodic review of his/her IEP. (Education Code 56195.8, 56342.1)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the Board prior to approving an out-of-state placement for any district student.

In accordance with Education Code 56366.2, the Superintendent or designee may apply to the Superintendent of Public Instruction to waive any of the requirements of Education Code 56365, 56366, 56366.3, and 56366.6.

Nonpublic, Nonsectarian School And Agency Services For Special Education

Master Contract

Every master contract with a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency shall be made on forms provided by the California Department of Education and shall include an individual services agreement negotiated for each student

Each master contract shall specify the general administrative and financial agreements for the special education and designated instruction and services, including student-teacher ratios as well as transportation if specified in the student's Individualized Education Program (IEP). The administrative provisions of the contract shall include procedures for recordkeeping and documentation, and the maintenance of school records by the district to ensure that appropriate high school graduation credit is received by the student. The contract may allow for partial or full-time attendance at the nonpublic, nonsectarian school. (Education Code 56366)

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The master contract shall include a description of the process being utilized by the district to oversee and evaluate placements in nonpublic, nonsectarian schools. With mutual agreement of the district and a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency, changes may be made to the administrative and financial agreements in the master contract at any time, provided the change does not alter a student's educational instruction, services, or placement as outlined in his/her individual services agreement. (Education Code 56366)

Placement and Services

The Superintendent or designee shall develop an individual services agreement for each student to be placed in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency based on the student's IEP. Each individual services agreement shall specify the length of time authorized in the student's IEP for the nonpublic, nonsectarian school services, not to exceed one year. Changes in a student's educational instruction, services, or placement shall be made only on the basis of revisions to the student's IEP. (Education Code 56366)

The IEP team of a student placed in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency shall annually review the student's IEP. The student's IEP and individual services agreement shall specify the review schedules. (5 CCR 3069)

Prior to the annual review of a student's IEP, the Superintendent or designee shall notify any high school district to which the student may transfer of the student's enrollment in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency. (5 CCR 3069)

When a special education student meets the district requirements for completion of prescribed course of study as designated in the student's IEP, the district shall award the student a diploma of graduation. (5 CCR 3070)

Out-of-State Placements

Before contracting with a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency outside California, the Superintendent or designee shall document the district's efforts to find an appropriate program offered by a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency within California. (Education Code 56365)

Within 15 days of any decision for an out-of-state placement, the student's IEP team shall submit to the Superintendent of Public Instruction a report with information about the services provided by the out-of-state program, the related costs, and the district's efforts to locate an appropriate public school or nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency within California. (Education Code 56365)

If the district decides to place a student with a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency outside the state, the district shall indicate the anticipated date of the student's return to a placement within California and shall document efforts during the previous year to return the student to California. (Education Code 56365)

Instruction

Cautionary Notice: As added and amended by SBX3 4 (Ch. 12, Third Extraordinary Session, Statutes of 2009), ABX4 2 (Ch. 2, Fourth Extraordinary Session, Statutes of 2009), and SB 70 (Ch. 7, Statutes of 2011), Education Code 42605 grants districts flexibility in "Tier 3" categorical programs. School libraries shall be open for use by students and teachers during the school day. (Education Code 18103)

With the approval of the Board, a school library may be open at other hours outside the school day, including evenings and Saturdays. Any library open to serve students during evening and Saturday hours shall be under the supervision of a certificated employee who consents to the assignment. (Education Code 18103)

District Plan

Whenever a school receives state funding for school and library improvement pursuant to Education Code 41570-41573, the school site council shall develop a single plan for student achievement which incorporates a districtwide plan for school libraries. (Education Code 41572)

In developing the districtwide plan, the Superintendent or designee is encouraged to consult with teacher librarians, classroom teachers, administrators, parents/guardians, and students as appropriate.

As appropriate, the plan may also address staffing, facilities, selection and evaluation of materials, prioritization of needs, and other related matters.

Classroom Libraries for Grades K-4

When state funding is available for classroom library materials in grades K-4, the Superintendent or designee shall develop, for certification by the Board, a districtwide classroom library plan for grades K-4. The plan shall include a means of preventing loss, damage, or destruction of the materials. (*Education Code 60242*)

The Superintendent or designee is encouraged to consult with primary grade teachers and teacher librarians employed by the district and/or county office of education in the development of the K-4 classroom library plan and to consider selections from the list of books recommended by the California Department of Education (CDE).

Selection and Evaluation of School Library Materials

Library materials shall include print and electronic resources that align with the curriculum and are accessible to students with varying cognitive or language needs.

Teacher librarians shall evaluate and select materials in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation and shall use professional selection aids and standards. The selection process shall invite recommendations from administrators, teachers, other staff, parents/guardians, and students as appropriate.

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Library Instruction

Teacher librarians and/or classroom teachers shall provide library instruction to develop students' information literacy skills. Such instruction shall be aligned with state academic standards for library instruction and shall prepare students to:

- 1. Access information by applying knowledge of the organization of libraries, print materials, digital media, and other sources
- 2. Evaluate and analyze information to determine appropriateness in addressing the scope of inquiry
- 3. Organize, synthesize, create, and communicate information

4. Integrate information literacy skills into all areas of learning and pursue information independently to become life-long learners.

Teacher librarians also may provide support to teachers, administrators, and other staff by identifying instructional materials that will aid in the development of curriculum and instructional activities and by providing information about effective and ethical uses of school library services and equipment.

Instruction

Identification And Education Under Section 504

The Governing Board believes that all children, including children with disabilities, should have an opportunity to learn in a safe and nurturing environment. The district shall work to identify children with disabilities who reside within its jurisdiction in order to ensure that they receive educational and related services required by law.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide identified students with disabilities with a free appropriate public education, as defined under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Such students shall receive regular or special education and related aids and services designed to meet their individual educational needs as adequately as the needs of nondisabled students are met. (34 CFR 104.33)

In addition, qualified students with disabilities shall be provided an equal opportunity to participate in programs and activities that are integral components of the district's basic education program, including, but not limited to, extracurricular athletics, interscholastic sports, and/or other nonacademic activities. (34 CFR 104.37)

In providing services to students with disabilities under Section 504, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure district compliance with law, including providing the students and their parents/guardians with applicable procedural safeguards and required notifications. Any dispute as to the identification, evaluation, or placement of any student with a disability shall be resolved in accordance with the processes specified in the "Procedural Safeguards" section of the accompanying administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a list of impartial hearing officers who are qualified and willing to conduct Section 504 hearings. To ensure impartiality, such officers shall not be employed by or under contract with the district in any other capacity except as hearing officer and shall not have any professional or personal involvement that would affect their impartiality or objectivity in the matter.

Instruction

Identification And Education Under Section 504

The Superintendent designates the following position as the district's 504 Coordinator to implement the requirements of Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973: (34 CFR 104.7)

Definitions

For the purpose of implementing Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the following terms and phrases shall have only the meanings specified below:

Free appropriate public education (FAPE) means the provision of regular or special education and related aids and services designed to meet the individual educational needs of a student with disabilities as adequately as the needs of nondisabled students are met, without cost to the student or his/her parent/guardian, except when a fee is imposed on nondisabled students. (34 CFR 104.33)

(cf. 3260 - Fees and Charges)

Student with a disability means a student who has a physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more major life activities. (34 CFR 104.3

Physical impairment means any-physiological disorder or condition, cosmetic disfigurement, or anatomical loss affecting one or more of the following body systems: neurological; musculosketal, special sense organs; respiratory, including speech organs; cardiovascular; reproductive, digestive, genito-urinary; hemic and lymphatic; skin; and endocrine. (34 CFR 104.3)

Mental impairment means any mental or psychological disorder, such as mental retardation, organic brain syndrome, emotional or mental illness, and specific learning disabilities. (34 CFR 104.3)

Substantially limits major life activities means limiting a person's ability to perform functions such as caring for himself/herself, performing manual tasks, seeing, hearing, eating, sleeping, walking, standing, lifting, bending, speaking, breathing, learning, reading, concentrating, thinking, communicating and working. Major life activities also includes major bodily functions such as functions of the immune system, normal cell growth, and digestive, bowel, bladder, neurological, brain, respiratory, circulatory, endocrine, and reproductive functions. Substantially limits shall be determined without regard to the ameliorative effects of mitigating measures other than ordinary eyeglasses or contact lenses. Mitigating measures include, but are not limited to, medications, prosthetic devices, assistive devices, learned

behavioral, or adaptive neurological modifications which an individual may use to eliminate or reduce the effects of an impairment. (42 USC 12102; 34 CFR 104.3)

Referral, Identification, and Evaluation

Any action or decision to be taken by the district involving the referral, identification, or evaluation of a student with disabilities shall be in accordance with the following procedures:

1. A parent/guardian, teacher, other school employee, student success team, or community agency may refer a student to the principal or 504 Coordinator for identification as a student with a disability under Section 504.

2. Upon receipt of any such referral, the principal, 04 Coordinator, or other qualified individual with expertise in the area of the student's suspected disability shall consider the referral and determine whether an evaluation is appropriate. This determination shall be based on a review of the student's school records, including those in academic and nonacademic areas of the school program; consultation with the student's teacher(s), other professionals, and the parent/guardian, as appropriate; and analysis of the student's needs.

If it is determined that an evaluation is unnecessary, the principal or 504 Coordinator shall inform the parents/guardians in writing of this decision and of the procedural safeguards, available as described in the "Procedural Safeguards" section below.

3. If it is determined that a student needs or is believed to need special education or related services under Section 504, the district shall conduct an evaluation of the student prior to initial placement (34 CFR 104.35)

Prior to conducting an initial evaluation of a student for eligibility under Section 504, the district shall obtain written parent/guardian consent.

The district's evaluation procedures shall ensure that the tests and other evaluation materials: (34 CFR 104.35)

- a. Have been validated and are administered by trained personnel in conformance with the instruction provided by the test publishers
- b. Are tailored to assess specific areas of educational need and are not merely designed to provide a single general intelligence quotient.
- c. Reflect the student's aptitude or achievement or whatever else the tests purport to measure rather than his/her impaired sensory, manual, or speaking skills except where those skills are the factors that the tests purport to measure.

Section 504 Services Plan and Placement

Services and placement decisions for students with disabilities shall be determined as follows:

1. A multi-disciplinary 504 team shall be convened to review the evaluation data in order to make placement decisions.

The 504 team shall consist of a group of persons knowledgeable about the student, the meaning of the evaluation data, and the placement options. (34 CFR 104.35)

In interpreting evaluation data and making placement decisions, the team shall draw upon information from a variety of sources, including aptitude and achievement tests, teacher recommendations, physical condition, social or cultural background, and adaptive behavior. The team shall also ensure that information obtained from all such sources is documented and carefully considered and that the placement decision is made in conformity with 34 CFR 104.34. (34 CFR 104.35)

2. If, upon evaluation, a student is determined to be eligible for services under Section 504, the team shall meet to develop a written 504 services plan which shall specify the types of regular or special education services, accommodations, and supplementary aids and services necessary to ensure that the student receives FAPE.

The parents/guardians shall be invited to participate in the meeting and shall be given an opportunity to examine all relevant records.

- 3. If the 504 team determines that no services are necessary for the student, the record of the team's meeting shall reflect whether or not the student has been identified as a disabled person under Section 504 and shall state the basis for the determination that no special services are presently needed. The student's parent/guardian shall be informed in writing of his/her rights and procedural safeguards, as described in the "Procedural Safeguards" section below.
- 4. The student shall be placed in the regular educational environment, unless the district can demonstrate that the education of the student in the regular environment with the use of supplementary aids and services cannot be achieved satisfactorily. The student shall be educated with those who are not disabled to the maximum extent appropriate to his/her individual needs. (34 CFR 104.34)

- 5. The district shall complete the identification, evaluation, and placement process within a reasonable time frame.
- 6. A copy of the student's Section 504 services plan shall be kept in his/her student record. The student's teacher(s) and any other staff who provide services to the student shall be informed of the plan's requirements.

If a student transfers to another school within the district, the principal or designee at the school from which the student is transferring shall ensure that the principal or designee at the new school receives a copy of the plan prior to the student's enrollment in the new school.

Review and Reevaluation

The 504 team shall monitor the progress of the student and, at least annually, shall review the effectiveness of the student's Section 504 services plan to determine whether the services are appropriate and necessary and whether the student's needs are being met as adequately as the needs of nondisabled students. In addition, each student with a disability under Section 504 shall be reevaluated at least once every three years.

A reevaluation of the student's needs shall be conducted before any subsequent significant change in placement. (34 CFR 104.35)

Procedural Safeguards

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of students with disabilities of all actions and decisions by the district regarding the identification, evaluation, or educational placement of their children. He/she also shall notify the parents/guardians of all the procedural safeguards available to them if they disagree with the district's action or decision, including an opportunity to examine all relevant records and an impartial hearing in which they shall have the right to participate. (34 CFR 104.36)

If a parent/guardian disagrees with any district action or decision regarding the identification, evaluation, or educational placement of his/her child under Section 504, he/she may request a Section 504 due process hearing within 30 days of that action or decision.

Prior to requesting a Section 504 due process hearing, the parent/guardian may, at his/her discretion, but within 30 days of the district's action or decision, request an administrative review of the action or decision. The Coordinator shall designate an appropriate administrator to meet with the parent/guardian to attempt to resolve the issue and the administrative review shall be held within 14 days of receiving the parent/guardian's request.

If the parent/guardian is not satisfied with the resolution of the issue, he/she may request a Section 504 due process hearing.

Section 504 due process hearing shall be conducted in accordance with the following procedures:

- 1. The parent/guardian shall submit a written request to the Coordinator within 30 days of receiving the district's decision or, if an administrative review is held, within 14 days of completion of the review. The request for the due process hearing shall include:
 - a. The specific nature of the decision with which he/she disagrees
 - b. The specific relief he/she seeks
 - c. Any other information he/she believes is pertinent to resolving the disagreement
- 2. Within 30 days of receiving the parent/guardian's request, the Superintendent or designee and 504 Coordinator shall select an impartial hearing officer. This 30-day deadline may be extended for good cause or by mutual agreement of the parties.
- 3. Within 45 days of the selection of the hearing officer, the Section 504 due process hearing shall be conducted and a written decision mailed to all parties. This 45-day deadline may be extended for good cause or by mutual agreement of the parties.
- 4. The parties to the hearing shall be afforded the right to:
 - a. Be accompanied and advised by counsel and by individuals with special knowledge or training related to the problems of students with disabilities under Section 504
 - b. Present written and oral evidence
 - c. Ouestion and cross-examine witnesses
 - d. Receive written findings by the hearing officer stating the decision and explaining the reasons for the decision

If desired, either party may seek a review of the hearing officer's decision by a federal court of competent jurisdiction.

Notifications

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district has taken appropriate steps to notify students and parents/guardians of the district's duty under Section 504. (34 CFR 104.32)

Summer School Learning Programs

Instruction

The Governing Board recognizes that an extended break from the instructional program may result in significant learning loss, especially among disadvantaged and low-achieving students, and desires to provide opportunities during the summer for students to practice essential skills and make academic progress.

Summer programs offered by the district shall be aligned with district goals and curriculum. When feasible, summer programs shall blend high-quality academic instruction in core curricular and/or elective subjects with recreation, nutrition programs, social/emotional development, and support services that encourage attendance, student engagement in learning, and student wellness.

When funds are available, the Superintendent or designee, with Board approval, shall establish summer school day and/or evening classes.

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The district's summer school program may be used to provide supplemental instruction for students failing to meet academic requirements and/or students who desire enrichment in core academic subjects in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. (Education Code 37252, 37252.2, 37252.8, 37253, 41505-41506; 5 CCR 11472)

Priority to enroll in summer school programs shall be given to district students who:

- 1. Are eligible for supplemental instruction on the basis of retention or recommendation for retention pursuant to Education Code 37252.2
- 2. Are eligible for supplemental instruction on the basis of insufficient progress toward passing the state high school exit examination pursuant to Education Code 37252
- 3. Need course credits in order to graduate from high school before the beginning of the next school year

The remaining openings may be offered to district students on a first-come first-served basis.

Because summer courses cover extensive instructional content in a relatively short time period, students who have more than three excused absences or one unexcused absence may not receive credit for summer session class(es) unless they make-up missed work in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Sites for summer school programs may be rotated in an effort to make summer school programs more accessible to all students, regardless of residence or regular attendance area, and to accommodate the maintenance needs of district schools.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board on summer school enrollment in the current year and previous year for the program as a whole and disaggregated by grade level, school that the students attend during the regular school year, and student population such as students from low-income families, students with disabilities, and English learners. In addition, he/she shall report on the extent to which students successfully achieved the academic outcomes established for the program.

The Superintendent or designee may collaborate with parents/guardians, city and county agencies, community organizations, child care providers, and/or other interested persons to develop, implement, and build awareness of organized activities that support summer learning.

Use Of School Facilities

BP 1330

Community Relations

The Governing Board believes that school facilities and grounds are a vital community resource which should be used to foster community involvement and development. Therefore, the Board authorizes the use of school facilities by district residents and community groups for purposes specified in the Civic Center Act, to the extent that such use does not interfere with school activities or other school-related uses.

(cf. 6145.5 - Student Organizations and Equal Access)

All school-related activities shall have priority in the use of facilities and grounds. Other uses authorized under the Civil Center Act shall be on a first-come, first-served basis.

As necessary to ensure efficient use of school facilities, the Superintendent or designee may, with the Board's approval, enter into an agreement for the joint use of any school facilities or grounds. The Board shall approve any such agreement only if it determines that it is in the best interest of the district and community.

Subject to prior approval by the Board, the Superintendent or designee may grant the use of school facilities on those days on which the school is closed. (Education Code 37220)

For effective management and control of school facilities and grounds, the Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures and regulations that: (Education Code 38133)

- 1. Aid, encourage, and assist groups desiring to use school facilities for approved activities
- 2. Preserve order in school buildings and on school grounds and protect school facilities, designating a person to supervise this task, if necessary

(cf. 0450 - Comprehensive School Safety Plan)(cf. 3516 - Emergencies and Disaster Preparedness Plan)

3. Ensure that the use of school facilities or grounds is not inconsistent with their use for school purposes and does not interfere with the regular conduct of school work.

There shall be no advertising on school facilities and grounds except as allowed by district policy specified in BP 1325 – Advertising and Promotion.

(cf. 1325 – Advertising and Promotion)

Fees

The Board shall grant the use of school facilities or grounds without charge to school-related organizations whose activities are directly related to or for the benefit of district schools. All other groups requesting the use of school facilities under the Civic Center Act shall be charged an amount not to exceed direct costs. However, if the use of school facilities or grounds is for religious services, the group shall be charged an amount that equals or exceeds direct costs determined in accordance with Education Code 38134.

In determining direct costs to be charged for community use of school facilities or grounds, including, but not limited to, playing or athletic fields, track and field venues, tennis courts, and outdoor basketball courts, the Superintendent or designee shall include a proportionate share of the costs of the following: (Education Code 38134)

- 1. Supplies, utilities, janitorial services, other services of district employees, and salaries of district employees directly associated with operation and maintenance of the school facilities or grounds involved
- 2. Maintenance, repair, restoration, and refurbishment of the school facilities or grounds

However, for classroom-based programs that operate after school hours, including, but not limited to, after-school, tutoring, and child care programs, direct costs to be charged shall not include the cost of maintenance, repair, restoration, or refurbishment of the school facilities or grounds. (Education Code 38134)

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Groups shall be charged fair rental value when using school facilities or grounds for entertainment or meetings where admission is charged or contributions solicited and net receipts are not to be expended for charitable purposes or for the welfare of the district's students. Use Of School Facilities

AR 1330

Community Relations

Application for Use of Facilities

Any persons applying for the use of any school facilities or grounds on behalf of any society, group, or organization shall present written authorization from the group or organization to make the application.

Persons or organizations applying for the use of school facilities or grounds shall submit a facilities use statement indicating that they uphold the state and federal constitutions and do not intend to use school premises or facilities to commit unlawful acts.

Civic Center Use

Subject to district policies and regulations, school facilities and grounds shall be available to citizens and community groups as a civic center for the following purposes: (Education Code 32282, 38131)

- 1. Public, literary, scientific, recreational, educational, or public agency meetings
- 2. The discussion of matters of general or public interest
- 3. The conduct of religious services for temporary periods, on a one-time or renewable basis, by any church or religious organization
- 4. Child care programs to provide supervision and activities for children of preschool and elementary school age

- 5. The administration of examinations for the selection of personnel or the instruction of precinct board members by public agencies
- 6. Supervised recreational activities including, but not limited to, sports league activities that are arranged for and supervised by entities, including religious organizations or churches, and in which youths may participate regardless of religious belief or denomination

7. A community youth center

8. Mass care and welfare shelters during disasters or other emergencies affecting the public health and welfare

(cf. 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan) (cf. 3516 - Emergencies and Disaster Preparedness Plan)

9. A ceremony, patriotic celebration, or related educational assembly conducted by a veterans' organization

A veterans' organization means the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, United Spanish War Veterans, Grand Army of the Republic, or other duly recognized organization of honorably discharged soldiers, sailors, or marines of the United States, or any of their territories. (Military and Veterans Code 1800)

10. Other purposes deemed appropriate by the Governing Board

The district may grant the use of school facilities on those days on which the public school is closed. (Education Code 37220)

Restrictions

School facilities or grounds shall not be used for any of the following activities:

- 1. Any use by an individual or group for the commission of any crime or any act prohibited by law
- 2. Any use which is inconsistent with the use of the school facility for school purposes or which interferes with the regular conduct of school or school work
- 3. Any use which involves the possession, consumption, or sale of alcoholic beverages or any restricted substances, including tobacco use

The district may exclude certain school facilities from non-school use for safety or security reasons.

Damage and Liability

Groups, organizations, or persons using school facilities or grounds shall be liable for any property damages caused by the activity. The district may charge the amount necessary to repair the damages and may deny the group further use of school facilities or grounds. (Education Code 38134)

Any group or organization using school facilities or grounds shall be liable for any injuries resulting from its negligence during the use of district facilities or grounds. The group shall bear the cost of insuring against this risk and defending itself against claims arising from this risk. (Education Code 38134)

Groups or organizations shall provide the district with evidence of insurance against claims arising out of the group's own negligence when using school facilities. (Education Code 38134) Groups or organizations shall also be required to include the district as an additional insured on their liability policies for claims arising out of the negligence of the group.

As permitted, the Superintendent or designee may require a hold harmless agreement and indemnification when warranted by the type of activity or the specific facility being used.

Financial Reports And Accountability

BP 3460

Business and Noninstructional Operations

The Governing Board is committed to ensuring public accountability and the fiscal health of the district. The Board shall adopt sound fiscal policies, oversee the district's financial condition, and continually evaluate whether the district's budget and financial operations support the district's goals for student achievement.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all financial reports are prepared in accordance with law and in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles and financial reporting standards stipulated by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board and the California Department of Education (CDE). He/she shall establish a system of ongoing internal controls to ensure the reliability of financial reporting.

(cf. 3400 - Management of District Assets/Accounts)

When required by law or the Board, the Superintendent or designee shall submit to the Board reports of the district's financial status, including, but not limited to, any report specified in this Board policy or accompanying administrative regulation. When any such report must be approved by the Board prior to its submission to a local, state, and/or federal agency, the Superintendent or designee shall provide the report to the Board in sufficient time to enable the Board to carefully review the report and meet any applicable submission deadline.

The Board shall regularly communicate the district's financial position to the public and shall use financial reports to determine what actions and budget amendments, if any, are needed to ensure the district's financial stability.

If district conditions predict fiscal distress or indicate that the district might not be able to meet its fiscal obligations, the Board and Superintendent or designee shall act quickly to identify and resolve these conditions. The Board shall work cooperatively with the County Superintendent of

Schools to improve the district's fiscal health and may contract with an external individual or organization to advise the district on fiscal matters.

Unaudited Actual Receipts and Expenditures

On or before September 15, the Board shall approve and file with the County Superintendent a statement of the district's unaudited actual receipts and expenditures for the preceding fiscal year. The Superintendent or designee shall prepare this statement using the state's standardized account code structure (SACS) as prescribed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI). (Education Code 42100)

Gann Appropriations Limit Resolution

On or before September 15, the Board shall adopt a resolution identifying, pursuant to Government Code 7900-7914, the district's estimated appropriations limit for the current fiscal year and the actual appropriations limit for the preceding fiscal year. Documentation used to identify these limits shall be made available to the public on the day of the Board meeting. (Education Code 42132; Government Code 7910)

Interim Reports/Certification of Ability to Meet Fiscal Obligations

The Superintendent or designee shall submit two interim fiscal reports to the Board, the first report covering the district's financial and budgetary status for the period ending October 31 and the second report covering the period ending January 31. The reports and supporting data shall be made available by the district for public review. (Education Code 42130)

Within 45 days after the close of the period reported, the Board shall approve the interim report and certify, on the basis of the interim report and any additional financial information known by the Board, whether the district will be able to meet its fiscal obligations for the remainder of the fiscal year and, based on current forecasts, for the two subsequent fiscal years. The certification shall be classified as one of the following: (Education Code 42130, 42131)

- 1. "Positive certification" indicating that the district will meet its financial obligations for the current fiscal year and two subsequent fiscal years
- 2. "Qualified certification" indicating that the district may not meet its financial obligations for the current fiscal year or two subsequent fiscal years
- 3. "Negative certification" indicating that the district will be unable to meet its financial obligations for the remainder of the fiscal year or the subsequent fiscal year

The Superintendent or designee shall submit a copy of each interim report and certification to the County Superintendent using the state's SACS software, as prescribed by the SPI. (Education Code 42130, 42131)

If the district's certification is subsequently changed by the County Superintendent from a positive to a qualified or negative certification, or from a qualified to a negative certification, the Board may appeal the decision to the SPI within five days of receiving the notice of change. (Education Code 42131)

Whenever the district receives a qualified or negative certification from the Board or the County Superintendent, the Superintendent or designee shall cooperate in the implementation of any remedial actions taken or prescribed by the County Superintendent under the authority granted to him/her pursuant to Education Code 42131.

If the second interim report is accompanied by a qualified or negative certification, the Board shall, no later than June 1, provide to the County Superintendent, the State Controller, and the SPI a financial statement as of April 30 ("third interim report") that projects the district's fund and cash balances through June 30. (Education Code 42131)

At any time during the year when the County Superintendent conducts a comprehensive review of the district's financial and budgetary conditions after he/she has determined that the district's budget does not comply with state criteria and standards for fiscal stability, the Board shall review the County Superintendent's recommendations at a public Board meeting. Within 15 days of receiving the report, the district shall notify the County Superintendent and the SPI of its proposed actions on the recommendation. (Education Code 42637)

Audit Report

By April 1 of each year, the Board shall provide for an annual audit of the district's books and accounts. (Education Code 41020)

To conduct the audit, the Board shall select a certified public accountant or public accountant licensed by the State Board of Accountancy from among those deemed qualified by the State Controller. (Education Code 41020, 41020.5)

The Board shall not select any public accounting firm to provide audit services if the lead or coordinating audit partner having primary responsibility for the audit, or the audit partner responsible for reviewing the audit, has performed audit services for the district in each of the six previous fiscal years. (Education Code 41020)

No later than December 15, the report of the audit for the preceding fiscal year shall be filed with the County Superintendent, the CDE, and the State Controller. (Education Code 41020)

Prior to December 15 whenever possible, but in no case later than January 31, the Board shall review, at an open meeting, the annual district audit for the prior year, any audit exceptions identified in that audit, the recommendations or findings of any management letter issued by the auditor, and any description of correction or plans to correct any exceptions or any issue raised in a management letter. (Education Code 41020.3)

The Board shall have an opportunity at the meeting to ask questions of the auditor and request further information about the audit findings.

Audit Committee

The Board may appoint an audit committee composed of staff knowledgeable about fiscal matters, other staff, and representatives of the community.

The committee shall serve in an advisory capacity and may:

- 1. Make recommendations regarding the selection of the external independent auditor in accordance with Education Code 41020 and 41020.5
- 2. Review the plan for the audit process with the independent auditor to determine the adequacy of the nature, scope, and timetable of the audit
- 3. Review the results of the audit and participate with the independent auditor and management in preparing final recommendations and responses
- 4. Participate with the independent auditor in presenting the audit report to the Board
- 5. Review Board policies and administrative regulations to recommend any revisions needed to ensure effective financial reporting
- 6. Provide input on the effectiveness of the independent auditor
- 7. Periodically report to the Board regarding the status of previous audit recommendations for improving the accounting and internal control systems

Interim Reports

Each interim fiscal report developed pursuant to Education Code 42130 shall include an assessment of the district budget as revised to reflect current information regarding the adopted state budget, district property tax revenues, if any, and ending balances for the preceding fiscal year. The report shall be based on State Board of Education (SBE) criteria and standards which address fund and cash balances, reserves, deficit spending, estimation of average daily attendance (ADA), projected enrollment, ratio of ADA to enrollment, projected revenue limit, salaries and benefits, other revenues and expenditures, and facilities maintenance. (Education Code 33128.3, 42130; 5 CCR 15453-15464)

The report shall also provide supplemental information regarding contingent liabilities, use of one-time revenues for ongoing expenditures, contingent revenues, contributions (i.e., projected contributions from unrestricted general fund resources to restricted general fund resources, projected transfers to or from the general fund to cover operating deficits in the general fund or any other fund, and capital project cost overruns that may impact the general fund budget), long-term commitments, unfunded liabilities, temporary interfund borrowings, the status of labor agreements, and the status of other funds. (Education Code 42130; 5 CCR 15453, 15464)

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Audit Report

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a timetable for the completion and review of the audit within the deadlines established by law.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the necessary financial records and cooperate with the auditor selected by the Governing Board to ensure that the audit report contains all information required by law and the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB).

The audit shall include an audit of income and expenditures by source of funds for all funds of the district, including the student body and cafeteria funds and accounts and any other funds under the

control or jurisdiction of the district, as well as an audit of student attendance procedures. (Education Code 41020)

If the district participates in the school district of choice program to accept interdistrict transfers, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the auditor, prior to the commencement of the audit, that the audit must include a review of the district's compliance with specified program requirements. (Education Code 48301)

(cf. 5117 - Interdistrict Attendance)

When required by federal law, specified records pertaining to the audit of federal funds received and expended by the district shall be transmitted to the federal clearinghouse designated by the federal Office of Management and Budget and shall be made available for public inspection. Such records shall be transmitted within 30 days after receipt of the auditor's report or within nine months after the end of the fiscal year, whichever is sooner, unless a longer period is agreed to in advance by the federal agency or a different period is specified in a program-specific audit guide. (31 USC 7502)

If an audit finding results in the district being required to repay an apportionment or pay a penalty, the district may appeal the finding to the Education Audit Appeals Panel by making an informal summary appeal within 30 days of receiving the final audit report or initiating a formal appeal within 60 days of receiving the report. (Education Code 41344, 41344.1)

While a public accounting firm is performing the audit of the district, it shall not provide any nonauditing, management, or other consulting services for the district except as provided in Government Auditing Standards, Amendment #3, published by the U.S. Government Accountability Office. (Education Code 41020)

Fund Balance

In accordance with GASB Statement 54, external financial reports shall report fund balances in the general fund within the following classifications based on the relative strength of constraints placed on the purposes for which resources can be used:

- 1. Nonspendable fund balance, including amounts that are not expected to be converted to cash, such as resources that are not in a spendable form or are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact
- 2. Restricted fund balance, including amounts constrained to specific purposes by their providers or by law

- 3. Committed fund balance, including amounts constrained to specific purposes by the Board
- 4. Assigned fund balance, including amounts which the Board or its designee intends to use for a specific purpose
- 5. Unassigned fund balance, including amounts that are available for any purpose

Negative Balance Report

Whenever the district reports a negative unrestricted fund balance or a negative cash balance in its annual budget or annual audit report, it shall include in the budget a statement that identifies the reasons for the negative unrestricted fund balance or negative cash balance and the steps that have been taken to ensure that the negative balance will not occur at the end of the current fiscal year. (Education Code 42127.5)

Non-Voter-Approved Debt Report

Upon approval by the Board to proceed with the issuance of revenue bonds or any agreement for financing school construction pursuant to Education Code 17170-17199.5, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the County Superintendent of Schools and the county auditor. The Superintendent or designee shall provide the Board, the County Auditor, the County Superintendent, and the public with related repayment schedules and evidence of the district's ability to repay the obligation. (Education Code 17150)

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When the Board is considering the issuance of certificates of participation and other debt instruments that are secured by real property and do not require the approval of the voters of the district, the Superintendent or designee shall provide notice to the County Superintendent and County Auditor no later than 30 days before the Board's approval to proceed with issuance. The Superintendent or designee shall provide the Board, the County Auditor, the County Superintendent, and the public with information necessary to assess the anticipated effect of the debt issuance, including related repayment schedules, evidence of the district's ability to repay the obligation, and the issuance costs. (Education Code 17150.1)

Other Postemployment Benefits Report (GASB 45)

In accordance with GASB Statement 45, the district's financial statements shall report the annual expense of nonpension other postemployment benefits (OPEBs) on an accrual basis over retirees' active working lifetime, as determined by a qualified actuary procured by the Superintendent or designee. To the extent that these OPEBs are not prefunded, the district shall report a liability on its financial statements.

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The Superintendent or designee shall annually present the estimated accrued but unfunded cost of

OPEBs and the actuarial report upon which those costs are based at a public meeting of the Board. (Education Code 42140)

The amount of the district's financial obligation for OPEBs shall be reevaluated every two or three years in accordance with GASB 45 depending on the number of members in the OPEB plan.

Workers' Compensation Claims Report

The Superintendent or designee shall annually provide the Board, at a public meeting, information and related actuarial reports showing the estimated accrued but unfunded cost of workers' compensation claims. The estimate of costs shall be based on an actuarial report completed at least every three years by a qualified actuary. (Education Code 42141)

Hazardous Substances BP 3514.1

Business and Noninstructional Operations

The Governing Board desires to provide a safe school environment that protects students and employees from exposure to potentially hazardous substances that may be used in the district's educational program and in the maintenance and operation of district facilities and equipment.

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Insofar as reasonably possible, the Superintendent or designee shall minimize the quantities of hazardous substances stored and used on school property. When hazardous substances must be used, the Superintendent or designee shall give preference to materials that cause the least risk to people and the environment.

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The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all potentially hazardous substances on district properties are inventoried, used, stored, and regularly disposed of in a safe and legal manner.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop, implement and maintain a written hazard communication program in accordance with 8 CCR 5194 and shall ensure that employees, students, and others as necessary are fully informed about the properties and potential hazards of substances to which they may be exposed.

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The Superintendent or designee shall develop specific measures to ensure the safety of students and staff in school laboratories where hazardous chemicals are used. Such measures shall include the development and implementation of a chemical hygiene plan in accordance with 8 CCR 5191 and instruction to students about proper handling of hazardous substances.

Hazardous Substances

Hazardous substance means a substance, material, or mixture which is likely to cause illness or injury by reason of being explosive, flammable, poisonous, corrosive, oxidizing, an irritant, or otherwise harmful. Hazardous substances, as identified by the Department of Industrial Relations, are listed in 8 CCR 339. (8 CCR 339, 5161)

Storage and Disposal of Chemicals

The Superintendent or designee shall adopt measures to ensure that hazardous substances on any district property are stored and disposed of properly in accordance with law. Such measures shall include, but are not limited to, the following: (8 CCR 5164)

- 1. Substances which react violently or evolve toxic vapors or gases when mixed, or which in combination become toxic, flammable, explosive, or otherwise hazardous, shall be separated from each other in storage by distance, partitions, secondary containment, or otherwise so as to preclude accidental contact between them.
- 2. Hazardous substances shall be stored in containers which are chemically inert to and appropriate for the type and quantity of the hazardous substance.
- 3. Containers of hazardous substances shall not be stored in such locations or manner as to result in physical damage to or deterioration of the container or where they are exposed to heat sufficient to rupture the container or to cause leakage.
- 4. Containers used to package a substance which gives off toxic, poisonous, corrosive, asphyxiant, suffocant, or anesthetic fumes, gases, or vapors in hazardous amounts, excluding small quantities of such materials kept in closed containers or materials kept in tank cars or trucks, shall not be stored in locations where it could be reasonably anticipated that persons would be exposed.

(cf. 3514 - Environmental Safety)

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly remove and dispose of all chemicals whose estimated shelf life has elapsed. (Education Code 49411)

Hazard Communication Program

The district's written hazard communication program shall include at least the components listed below and shall be available upon request to all employees and their designated representatives.

The program shall apply to any hazardous substance which is known to be present in the workplace in such manner that employees may be exposed under normal conditions of use or in a reasonably forseeable emergency resulting from workplace operations. (8 CCR 5194)

1. Container Labeling

No container of hazardous substance, unless exempted by law, shall be accepted by the district or any district school unless labeled, tagged, or marked by the supplier with the identity of the hazardous substance, hazard warning statements, and the name and address of the chemical manufacturer or importer. No label on an incoming container shall be removed or intentionally defaced unless the container is immediately marked with the required information.

Whenever hazardous substances are transferred from their original containers to other containers, the secondary containers shall likewise be labeled with the identity and hazard warning statement, unless the substances are intended only for the immediate use of the employee who performs the transfer.

2. Safety Data Sheets

Upon receiving a hazardous substance or mixture, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the manufacturer, or importer, has furnished a Safety Data Sheet (SDS) as required by law. If the SDS is missing or obviously incomplete, the Superintendent or designee shall, within seven working days of noting the missing or incomplete information, request a new SDS from the manufacturer, or importer. If a response is not received within 25 working days, the Superintendent or designee shall send a copy of the district's written inquiry to the California Occupational Safety and Health Division. (Cal/OSHA) (8 CCR 5194)

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain the required SDS for each hazardous substance in the workplace and shall ensure that it is readily accessible to employees in their work area during working hours. The SDS may be maintained in paper copy, electronically, or through other means, provided that employees have immediate access and understand how to use the alternative system.

3. Employee Information and Training

Employees shall receive information and training on hazardous substances in their work area at the time of their initial assignment and whenever a new hazard is introduced into their work area. The information and training shall include but are not limited to, the following topics: (8 CCR 5194)

- a. The requirements of (8 CCR 5194), including employee rights described therein
- b. The location and availability of the district's written hazard communication program, including the list of hazardous materials and all SDS
- c. Any operations in the work area where hazardous substances are present

- d. The physical and health effects of the hazardous substances in the work area
- e. Methods and observations that may be used to detect the presence or release of hazardous substances in the work area
- f. Measures that employees can take to protect themselves from exposure to hazardous substances, including specific procedures the district has implemented to protect employees, such as appropriate work practices, emergency procedures, and personal protective equipment to be used
- g. How to read and use the labels and SDS

4. List of Hazardous Substances

The written hazard communication program shall include a list of the hazardous substances known to be present in the workplace as a whole or for individual work areas. (8 CCR 5194)

5. Hazardous Nonroutine Tasks

When employees are required to perform hazardous nonroutine tasks or to work on unlabeled pipes that contain hazards, they shall first receive information about the specific hazards to which they may be exposed during this activity and the protective/safety measures which must be used, such as ventilation, respirators, other personal protective equipment, and/or the presence of another employee. They shall also receive information about emergency procedures to follow if accidentally exposed to the hazardous substance.

6. Information to Contractors

To ensure that outside contractors and their employees work safely in district facilities, the Superintendent or designee shall inform contractors of hazardous substances which are present on the site and precautions that they may take to lessen the possibility of exposure. It shall be the contractor's responsibility to disseminate this information to his/her employees and subcontractors.

Chemical Hygiene Plan

The district's chemical hygiene plan shall address exposure to hazardous chemicals in school laboratories and shall include the following components: (8 CCR 5191)

- 1. Standard operating procedures relevant to safety and health considerations to be followed when laboratory work involves the use of hazardous chemicals
- 2. Criteria that the district will use to determine and implement control measures to reduce exposure to hazardous chemicals, including engineering controls, the use of personal protective equipment, and hygiene practices
- 3. A requirement that protective equipment comply with state regulations and that specific measures be taken to ensure proper and adequate performance of such equipment
- 4. Provision of specified information at the time of an employee's initial assignment to a work area where hazardous chemicals are present and prior to assignments involving new exposure situations
- 5. Provision of specified employee training in accordance with the schedule determined by the Superintendent or designee
- 6. The circumstances under which a particular laboratory operation, procedure, or activity shall require prior approval of the Superintendent or designee before implementation
- 7. Provisions for medical consultations and examinations whenever there is evidence, as specified, that the employee may have been exposed to a hazardous chemical
- 8. Designation of an employee, who is qualified by training or experience, to serve as the district's chemical hygiene officer to provide technical guidance in the development and implementation of the chemical hygiene plan
- 9. Provisions for additional employee protection for work with particularly hazardous substances, as specified

The plan shall be readily available to employees and employee representatives, and, upon request, to Cal/OSHA. (8 CCR 5191)

The Superintendent or designee shall review and evaluate the effectiveness of the chemical hygiene plan at least annually and shall update it as necessary. (8 CCR 5191)

Governing Board Elections

BB 9220 **Board Bylaws**

Any person is eligible to be a Governing Board member, without further qualifications, if he/she is 18 years of age or older, a citizen of the state, a resident of the school district, a registered voter, and not legally disqualified from holding civil office. (Education Code 35107)

Any person who has been convicted of a felony involving the giving, accepting, or offering of a bribe, embezzlement or theft of public funds, extortion, perjury, or conspiracy to commit any such crime, under California law or the law of another state, the United States of America, or another country, is not eligible to be a candidate for office or be a Board member except when he/she has been granted a pardon in accordance with law. (Education Code 35107; Elections Code 20)

A district employee elected to the Board shall resign his/her position before being sworn in or shall have his/her employment automatically terminated upon being sworn into office. (Education Code 35107)

(cf. 9224 - Oath of Affirmation) (cf. 9270 - Conflict of Interest)

To reduce costs associated with conducting elections, the Board may consolidate Board elections with the local municipal or statewide primary or general election. Board election procedures shall be conducted in accordance with state and federal law.

(cf. 9110 - Terms of Office)

The district is divided into trustee areas and each trustee area shall be represented by a Board member who resides in and is elected by voters residing within that trustee area. Trustee areas shall be balanced by population as required by state and federal law.

Prior to March 1 following the year in which the results of each decennial federal census are released, the Board shall adjust the boundaries of the district's trustee areas based on population figures as validated by the Population Research Unit of the Department of Finance. (Education Code 5019.5)

Campaign Conduct

In order to help protect the public's trust in the electoral process as well as the public's confidence in the Board and district, the Board encourages all candidates to sign and adhere to the principles in the Code of Fair Campaign Practices pursuant to Elections Code 20440.

(cf. 0410 - Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities) (cf. 9005 - Governance Standards)

Statement of Qualifications

The district shall assume no part of the cost of printing, handling, translating, or mailing of candidate statements filed pursuant to Elections Code 13307. As a condition of having candidate statements included in the voter's pamphlet, the district may require candidates to pay their estimated pro rata share of these costs to the district in advance pursuant to Elections Code 13307.

On the 125th day prior to the day fixed for the general district election, the Board secretary or his/her designee shall deliver a notice, bearing the secretary's signature and district seal, to the county elections official describing both of the following: (Elections Code 10509)

- 1. The elective offices of the district to be filled at the general election and which offices, if any, are for the balance of an unexpired term
- 2. Whether the district or the candidate is to pay for the publication of a statement of qualifications pursuant to Elections Code 13307

(cf. 9223 - Filling Vacancies)

Candidate statements shall be limited to no more than 200 words. (Elections Code 13307)

Tie Votes in Board Member Elections

Whenever a tie makes it impossible to determine which of two or more candidates has been elected to the Board, the Board shall immediately notify the candidates who received the tie votes of the time and place where the candidates or their representatives should appear before the Board. The Board at that time shall determine the winner by lot. (Education Code 5016)

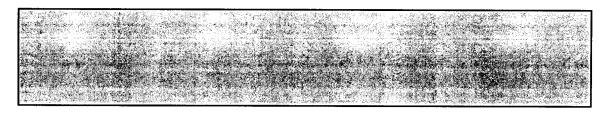

TENTATIVE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE MADERA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND THE ADULT EDUCATORS BARGAINING UNIT

The parties have completed negotiations for the 2012-2013 school year. The parties agree to keep current contract language except for the following:

- 3.6 Forty (40) hours per week is a "full-time" assignment". Teachers who meet the criterion and who have completed two consecutive years in a full-time assignment and are in the third consecutive year of a full-time assignment are permanent, as complete school year requires service of 75% of the duty days (E.C. 44908).
- 3.6.1 Teachers working not more than 60% of the hours per week (24) considered full-time assignment as defined are temporary regardless of length of service. (E.C. 44929.25.)
- Preparation time shall be based on actual teaching time. Teachers working more than twenty-four (24) hours per week, shall be entitled to two (2) hours preparation time per week.

 Teachers working thirty-five (35) hours or more per week shall be entitled to four (4) hours preparation time per week. Preparation time is to be performed on site and shall include the following activities: lesson plans, fill in CASAS (state student record form) entries and tests, complete CASAS update records for each student, correct student work, correct student tests, copy weekly records, and generate signature sheets for classes. Teachers working in the older adult, distant learning, ISP programs, and the jail program shall be excluded from this section because they are subject to other arrangements.
- 12.1 Unit members whose regular teaching assignment is <u>forty (40)</u> or more hours per week, shall receive medical, dental, and vision coverage through the California Valued Trust as follows: (the remainder of Article 12 remains unchanged)
- 23.1 The term of the Collective Bargaining Agreement is extended through June 30, 2013.

In the event that the Madera Unified Teachers Association or Classified School Employee Association is subjected to an annual maximum contribution toward health and welfare benefits insurance (i.e., a cap), through an agreement or otherwise, the parties agree that employees in the Adult Educators unit will be subjected to the same concessions/enhancements.

Health and Welfare Benefits for Existing Benefited Employees

The parties agree that the existing employees receiving benefits (Richard Mann, Madelyn Jones, and Hanadi Rousan) will continue to be eligible for health and welfare benefit eligibility, despite working fewer than forty (40) hours per work, as follows: The District shall contribute seventy percent (70%) of MUSD Plan 3 for Health and Welfare package with the unit member contributing thirty percent (30%) of the overall cost of the same coverage.

Work Year and Work Week

The work year for the 2012-2013 school year will consist of up to 176 days (unless a work year reduction occurs as set forth above), and the District intends to primarily offer adult education courses on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Some courses will also be provided on Mondays.

Community Based Education Courses

The parties agree that any fee-based course that is contracted by an outside source and not open to the public is not considered to be bargaining unit work (e.g., GED and ESL courses). Existing bargaining unit members may apply for such positions and will receive consideration by the District. However, the District reserves the right to determine who to appoint to such positions. The parties agree that community enrichment courses (e.g., dance, guitar, floral design, anger management, exercise, arts, etc.) are also not considered to be bargaining unit work.

AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT FOR EMPLOYMENT OF DISTRICT DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT

This Amendment to the Employment Agreement dated September 24, 2013 is made by and between the Governing Board of the Madera Unified School District ("District") and Anthony Monreal ("Employee")(collectively referred to as the "Parties"), as to the Employment Agreement between the parties dated on or about July 1, 2012, as follows:

HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS

1. The existing Section 3 of the Employment Agreement shall be deleted and replaced with the following:

The Deputy Superintendent shall be entitled to participate in the same Health & Welfare benefits as are provided to the Certificated Management Bargaining Association ("CMBA") employees. The District's contribution toward the Deputy Superintendent's health and welfare benefits shall be capped at \$14,163 per year, and prorated for any partial year of employment. In the event that the Certificated Management Bargaining Association is subjected to a reduced maximum contribution toward health and welfare benefits (i.e. a reduced cap), the Deputy Superintendent shall be subject to the same reduction. Similarly, if the Certificated Management Bargaining Association receives a higher contribution toward health and welfare benefits, Deputy Superintendent shall receive the same.

2. All other terms and conditions of the Employment Agreement shall remain unchanged and in full force and effect.
